Chapter 1: INTRODUCTION

This Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP) was prepared pursuant to Wisconsin Statute §23.30 Outdoor Recreation Program. This section serves "to promote, encourage, coordinate, and implement a comprehensive long-range plan to acquire, maintain, and develop for public use, those areas of the state best adapted to the development of a comprehensive system of state and local outdoor recreation facilities and services..."

Submission of this adopted CORP to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources establishes eligibility for the local unit of government to apply for a variety of Federal and State Aids for outdoor recreation (Chapter NR 50.06(4), Wisconsin administrative code).

1.1 Purpose

The primary purpose of this outdoor recreation plan is to provide continued direction toward meeting the current and future recreation needs of the Town of Rib Mountain.

Adoption of this plan by the Town of Rib Mountain Board and subsequent acceptance by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) will continue the Town's eligibility for Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Program (LWCF), and State Knowles–Nelson Stewardship Program funds.

Non-profit groups, foundations, and the general public may also use this document to coordinate their own private efforts for developing outdoor recreation facilities.

1.2 Provisions for Plan Updates

Plan amendments are common and should be considered part of the planning process. They frequently represent good implementation or plan usage and should be acceptable for consideration by local decision makers.

Annual review of the plan recommendations and capital improvement list by the Town of Rib Mountain Park Commission will keep this plan current. This review may also occur after a large turn over in elected officials after an election.

Annual Review Process:

1. The Town of Rib Mountain Park Commission reviews plan and takes a vote on what changes to make.
2. Town Board adopts changes by resolution.
3. Those changes and a copy of the approval resolution are forwarded to the DNR's Community Financial Assistance staff in Eau Claire. Submission of the changes and resolution automatically constitutes DNR grant eligibility for those changes.

Establishing a **full plan update every five years** will assure that the plan reflects changes in the recreational needs of the Town, and will extend the community's eligibility for grant programs for another 5 years. DNR approval of the ORP will come if the correct process was followed during all the steps for the full plan update.

1.3 Reference Plans & Laws

This plan was written to continue the parks and recreation program established in the Town of Rib Mountain Outdoor Recreation Plans since 1978. Each plan and law listed below affects outdoor recreation in the Town of Rib Mountain.

Town of Rib Mountain Comprehensive Plan, 2020

The Town of Rib Mountain Comprehensive Plan was updated in 2020. This document covers all types of development that may occur throughout the Town of Rib Mountain. The 2020 Plan also encourages the Town to continue updating the Town’s Outdoor Recreation Plan to maintain and develop park facilities that residents want.

The following recreation goals and objectives are from the Town of Rib Mountain Comprehensive Plan:

Utility & Community Facility Goal III: Maintain and improve parks in Rib Mountain to improve the quality of life in the Town through the regular modification and adoption of the Outdoor Recreation Plan as prescribed by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Objectives:

1. Strive to provide the metro area’s premier park and recreation facilities while meeting the needs of current and future residents.
2. Supports development of an interconnected system of parks through trails and parkways.
3. Provide timely and sufficient maintenance of park facilities.
4. Establish a Park Facilities Maintenance Plan to proactively upgrade and replace equipment to ensure safety and accommodate residents’ recreational needs. Work with community organizations to develop a community center or similar facility.
5. Routinely review and update the Town’s park dedication and impact fee requirements to ensure they are reasonable and sufficient to address needs, and encourage new residential developments to include parks, green space and trails as appropriate.
6. Identify opportunities to purchase property for future park or trail development. Map these properties as “future park” to encourage preservation for future park development on the Official Map.
7. Support the development of a regional multi-use trail system and work with appropriate agencies, such as the WDNR, WDOT, Marathon County, and others, to identify possible trail routes in Rib Mountain to connect to a regional system and to the Mountain-Bay Trail.
8. Work with the Marathon County and surrounding municipalities in efforts to enhance the regional bike and pedestrian route system throughout the Wausau Metro Area.
9. Identify where trails should be installed in conjunction with new development or road construction and map these on the Official Map.

10. Establish requirements for provision of trail easements or the purchasing of right-of-way in conjunction with new development.
11. Continue to work cooperatively with the WDNR on efforts to improve Rib Mountain State Park.
12. Continue to work cooperatively with Granite Peak Ski Resort to ensure that development and expansion is done in an environmentally sensitive manner.

Utility & Community Facility Goal IV: Adopt an updated Official Map

Objectives:

1. The map shall increase the connectivity of motorized and pedestrian traffic throughout the Town.
2. The map shall show locations of future neighborhood parks in locations per the current *Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan*.
3. The map shall show updated pathways for future trails and other pedestrian facilities specified throughout this plan.

Transportation Goal IV: Adopt an updated Official Map

Objectives:

2. The map shall show locations of future neighborhood parks in locations per the current *Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan*.
3. The map shall show updated pathways for future trails and other pedestrian facilities specified throughout this plan.

Rib Mountain Area Bike and Pedestrian Route Long-Range Plan

The Town of Rib Mountain has mapped a number of short and long-term trail (off-street and route on-street) bikeway improvements, including: existing off-road facilities, existing road shoulder inventory, suggested bike routes on low-volume roads, planned off road facilities, and other proposed bike/pedestrian facilities. The Rib Mountain Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Subcommittee continues to recommend updates to the following two maps as necessary:

- See Map 3: “Existing Rib Mountain Bicycle and Pedestrian Routes.”
- See Map 4: “Proposed Rib Mountain Bicycle and Pedestrian Routes.”

Town of Rib Mountain Resolution, No. 08-03

The Town Board adopted this resolution to require installation of bike and pedestrian improvements as part of any development project located along a planned bike or pedestrian route.

Wausau MPO Bicycle And Pedestrian Plan, 2015

The Wausau Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) prepared the Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan in 2015. The plan developed strategies for improving bicycle and pedestrian transportation throughout the Wausau area. Potential trails and routes are identified and an improvement schedule was created for each project.

A look into the future, CWOCC Master Plan, 2013

The Central Wisconsin Offroad Cycling Coalition (CWOCC) created the master plan to make the Wausau area an official International Mountain Bicycling Association (IMBA) Ride Center.

IMBA Ride Center evaluation criteria were also reviewed to determine other community aspects of what the Town of Rib Mountain could do to help make the whole area more bicycle friendly, and recommendations were added to Chapter 6.

Five parts are planned within the Town of Rib Mountain:

Nine Mile County Forest

Existing trail system with 12 miles of single track and 20+ miles of double track. Single track is hand built technical riding.

Mosinee Hill

XC mountain bike & flow trail. Multiuse or additional hiking trail. Bike park on northwest side.

Rib Mountain State Park

XC mountain bike & flow trail (quarry area) around perimeter of State Park. Connected to lift served trails on ski hill and connector to Nine Mile County Forest trails.

Granite Peak ski lease land

Beginner to Expert gravity based flow trail. Lift or Shuttle served possible. Potential for freeride park.

Urban bike park

Hwy 29/I-39 interchange. Pump track, dirt jump, other technical features. Connects to Liberty Park (Town of Rib Mountain park).

Marathon County Forest Comprehensive Land Use Plan, 2021-2035

The Marathon County Forest Fifteen-Year Comprehensive Use Plan is a management guide for the Marathon County Forest and is updated every fifteen years. The mission of the plan is to manage and protect natural resources within the county forest on a sustainable basis for the ecological, economic, educational, recreational, and research needs of present and future residents throughout the county. The report includes a number of recommendations for timber management, wildlife habitat and

game management, land acquisition and forest boundary management, biodiversity management, watershed management and tourism.

The land within the blocking boundary primarily includes private land. It is not the deliberate intent of Marathon County to acquire all lands within the blocking boundary.

See **Map 5 Park Service Areas** for where the county blocking boundaries are located:

1. Potential Acquisition Zone; and
2. Potential Connector Acquisition (Rib Mtn. State Park/9 Mile).

Certain lands are considered to be of higher priority for acquisition due to:

- Lands that will provide for priority trail connections and expansions or reduce or eliminate existing user conflicts.

Marathon County Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, 2020-2024

Marathon County has recognized the importance of providing quality recreational opportunities to its residents by developing and updating a Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP). The Marathon County Parks Department commissioned this 5-year plan.

Rib Mountain State Park Master Planning

In 2020-2021, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is revising the 2005 master plan for Rib Mountain State Park.

The planning process will evaluate the full range of public uses occurring at the park, and habitat management opportunities. In addition, options for the future will be assessed, including the possibility of new recreation activities. The planning process will evaluate a potential expansion of the Granite Peak Ski Area.

Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) 2019-2023

Every five years, the Wisconsin DNR publishes a SCORP as required by the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965. At its core, this SCORP is used to help allocate federal funds equitably among local communities, but the document also transcends many levels of outdoor recreation discussion and policy.

This SCORP lays out five overarching goals for outdoor recreation:

1. Boost participation in outdoor recreation.
 2. Grow partnerships.
 3. Provide high-quality experiences.
 4. Improve data to enhance visitor experiences and benefits.
 5. Enhance funding and financial stability.
- Park design and location criteria from SCORP are described in **Attachment A**.
 - SCORP identified outdoor recreation needs are in **Attachment E**.

State Trails Network Plan

This 2003 document clarifies the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) role and strategy in the provision of all types of trails. The plan identifies a series of potential trail corridors that would link existing trails, public lands, natural features, and communities. This statewide network of interconnected trails would be owned and maintained by municipalities, private entities, and partnerships of the two. Preserving transportation corridors, such as old rail lines, is specifically discussed as a very important strategy in the creation of recreational and alternative transportation corridors. Two segments affect the Town of Rib Mountain.

Segment 18 – Tomahawk to Wisconsin Dells

A power line corridor along County Highway X from Wausau to Stevens Point should be considered a component of the statewide "backbone" trail system. This potential trail not only connects the communities of Wausau and Stevens Point, but also could link with the Green Circle State Trail and several other proposed trail corridors.

NCWRPC Note: This power line corridor is on the west side of the Wisconsin River in the Town of Rib Mountain. The Trillium Trail was constructed in this power line right-of-way.

Segment 52 – Wausau to Marshfield

Marathon County also recognizes this abandoned rail corridor from Wausau to Marshfield as having significant trail potential. After rail line abandonment in the early 1980s the county took part of the rail right-of-way for tax purposes. A section near Wausau serves as a power line corridor. Sections of corridor have also reverted to adjacent landowners, but there may be opportunities for easements.

NCWRPC Note: This potential corridor is in the Marathon County Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan 2020-2024 for potential development as a trail.

Wisconsin Land Legacy Report, 2006-2056

This WDNR report is a comprehensive inventory of the special places that will be critical to meet future conservation and outdoor recreation needs in Wisconsin for the next fifty years. The Land Legacy report recommends protection of these lands by using federal, state, and local funding opportunities; along with: possibly creating new kinds of incentives for landowners, working to craft comprehensive plans, or offering different types of technical assistance.



As the Wisconsin River meanders across this ecological landscape, it flows through a number of communities, including Merrill, Wausau, Rothschild, and Mosinee. Surrounding land use is a mix of agricultural and forested land. Numerous hydroelectric facilities are found throughout this reach of the river. The middle portion of the Wisconsin River is an important biological and recreation corridor linking northern and southern Wisconsin.

Due to the proximity of several large population centers, this portion of the river receives substantial public use with recreational boating, fishing, and waterfowl hunting being particularly popular activities. Large numbers of anglers take advantage of the river's robust warmwater fishery, which includes muskies in the upper stretches, and walleye, smallmouth bass, and several other species elsewhere. The black redhorse is found below the dam in Wausau, the only place in the state that it is known to occur.

Upland forests in the area typically contain a mix of oaks, aspen, and conifers, while the floodplain forests dominated by silver maple, green ash, and hackberry. In concert with associated marshes, these forests provide important habitat for a variety of resident and migratory wildlife. In addition to its aesthetic value, maintaining natural shoreline along the river is important for maintaining and improving water quality. A protected corridor could possibly allow for the establishment of a network of recreation trails.






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

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Chapter 2:

BACKGROUND OF RIB MOUNTAIN

2.1 Introduction

Potential opportunities and limitations start with understanding an area. This section provides a basic feel for what the Town of Rib Mountain looks like physically, demographically, and economically.

The area now constituting the Town of Rib Mountain was part of the Town of Weston until 1905. The Town was formed in 1905, and was a rural farm area called “Fleith” until 1930 when the name changed to Rib Mountain. Although the Town was initially settled as a rural agricultural area, it has evolved into a dynamic, growing suburban area to the City of Wausau.

The Town of Rib Mountain has a 2020 Wisconsin Demographic Services Center (WDOA) estimated population of 7,001 people and is part of the Wausau urbanized area in Marathon County. Single family and multi-family housing is still being constructed, and commercial properties continue to turn over into new businesses due to their preferred easily accessible locations.

The natural features (e.g., wetlands, forest, wildlife, and steep slopes) are described and mapped in the Town of Rib Mountain Comprehensive Plan of 2020 (not part of this plan). The Wisconsin River segment that runs through the Town of Rib Mountain and all of Marathon County is an impaired water, because of atmospheric deposition of mercury mainly from fossil fuel fired power plants, PCB contamination, and total phosphorus. Waters in the Town of Rib Mountain are not listed as Areas of Special Natural Resource Interest, nor are they designated by DNR as outstanding resource waters or exceptional resource waters. The water resources, park locations, and road layout exist on Map 1.

2.2 Land Use

The Town is located on 24.6 square miles of land along the western shore of the Wisconsin River. Rib Mountain State Park is surrounded by the Town. Most of the big box retailers in the Wausau area are along Rib Mountain Drive. Large lot subdivisions continue to grow throughout the Town. Hundreds of agricultural acres are still farmed in Town too.

2.3 Demographics

In 2020, the Town of Rib Mountain’s WDOA population was estimated at 7,001 (see Table 1). By 2025, the Wisconsin Demographic Services Center (WDOA) projects that the Town of Rib Mountain’s population will increase by 144 people (2.1%) and is projected to increase by 189 people (2.7%) by 2030.



Figure 1 is The Town of Rib Mountain’s population pyramid that was created with 2019 American Community Survey data from the U.S. Census. The Town of Rib Mountain’s population shows an almost equal amount of men to women, but not in each age group. There are almost the same number of residents over 65 years old (1,453) as under 20 years old (1,837).

Demographic Trends

Table 2 shows a comparison over generally the last decade for the Town of Rib Mountain. Families with young children under 5 years old continue to become residents in the Town of Rib Mountain at the same rate as a decade ago. Young residents under 18 years have declined by almost 2%, while those residents over 65 years have jumped by 5.7%. Educational attainment over the last decade has risen among Town residents, with a 3.4% gain of those having a high school diploma, and a 3.5% gain in residents with bachelor's degrees. The number of people in each household has gone up in Town by 0.1%, which is opposite the prevailing national trend of much fewer people per household. Median household income is higher in total dollars, but is about \$3,600 less than what inflation would provide.

2.4 Economic Development

In 2019, the Town of Rib Mountain had a 64.0% labor force participation rate, and about 2.28% unemployment (see **Table 3**).

Of the 3,328 workers who lived in the Town of Rib Mountain in 2019, 84.5% drove alone to work, 7.5% carpooled, 0.3% took other means, and 7.7% worked at home. The mean travel time to work was 16.5 minutes.

Further economic development analysis is done at the county level:

Manufacturing, the largest industry super-sector in Marathon County by employment, gained 513 jobs from 2017 to 2018, increasing at a rate of 3.15%. This industry super-sector displayed the greatest numerical gain of jobs. Public Administration, the industry super-sector displaying the greatest proportional increase of jobs, gained 78 jobs from 2017 to 2018, increasing at a rate of 4.13%. Natural Resources & Mining, the super-sector displaying the greatest proportional loss, lost 68 jobs, decreasing at a rate of -5.78%. (OEA, WDWD)

Roughly 85% of Marathon County residents work within the county. This is significantly higher than the median of 65% for Wisconsin counties, ranking Marathon as the 5th highest county in terms of the percent of residents who work within the county. The exceptional retention rate implies that nearby counties are likely offering fewer or less desirable job opportunities. (OEA, WDWD)

Marathon's unemployment rate of 2.7% in 2018 is considerably low, historically speaking, significantly lower than the 10-year average. This rate is similar to the rates experienced during the booming economy of the late 1990s, when many counties hit their previous historical lows. (WDOA)

Employment across all industries in Marathon County is expected to grow by 7.3% between 2016 and 2026, or 16,095 workers. This projection only forecasts levels of filled positions rather than potential demand. (OEA, WDWD)

Baby boomers continue to exit the workforce in great numbers. However, the labor force participation rates for workers over 55 years of age have risen significantly. The need or want to remain in the workforce has assisted in staving off more severe worker shortages. (OEA, WDWD)

Chapter 3:

EXISTING RECREATION FACILITIES

The Town of Rib Mountain park system consists of parks maintained by the Town, along with two public school grounds, a county park, a county forest, and a state park. The Town only maintains Town parks, but provides input and financial assistance to the school district on how to improve both public school play areas for public use.

Map 1 shows outdoor recreational opportunities within the Town.

Linear Parks

Linear Parks are trails that may have various lengths. (See Attachment A.)

Water Trails – A water trail is a network of access points, resting places, and attractions for users of water craft on lakes and rivers. All navigable water is available to canoe on.

There is an ongoing effort to mark the Voyageur Heritage Waterways. The project consists of marking a water trail via signs by landings on Lake Wausau and the Big Rib River in the Town of Rib Mountain.

The Wisconsin River has a portage established on the west bank around the Rothschild Dam. There are 2 boat landings within the Town and 6 non-improved public access points, as shown on Map 1.

Bluegill Bay County Park: This is the busiest boat launch in the Town. See this park's description under County Parks later in this chapter.

Gulliver's Landing Boat Launch: This is a boat launch across the street from Gulliver's Landing Restaurant. The park is a 20-foot paved shoulder to Mallard Lane, which provides about 18 car parking spots. On-street parallel parking is available for vehicles with trailers. A pier is available for 2 boats to dock to.

Rookery View Park: This 2 acre park is a peninsula surrounded by Lake Wausau. Facilities include an improved boat launch that is only open for winter vehicular access to Lake Wausau, a gravel parking area for about 10 cars, about an acre of mowed lawn is available for picnics and viewing the rookery on Lake Wausau, and a sandy area for kayaks to launch from onto Lake Wausau

Domtar Company Boat Launch: This 8 acre boat launch is along the west bank of the Wisconsin River and owned & operated by the Domtar Company. Access to this boat launch is off Sunrise Lane in the Town of Rib Mountain and open to the public, however, please be aware of Rothschild Ordinance No. 12.13 relating to boating below the Rothschild Dam in the Wisconsin River.

Public Water Access Points: Every time a land subdivision occurs next to a public waterbody, then an access point must be established for the public to access that water body [236.16(3) Wisconsin Statutes]. There are 6 unimproved public access points to the Wisconsin River and Lake Wausau within Rib Mountain. See Map 1.

Snowmobile Trails – Marathon County has 790 miles of snowmobile trails that are maintained by multiple snowmobile clubs. These trails pass around the west side of the Town of Rib Mountain in the non-urban portions of the Town. Lake Wausau can also be used for snowmobiling to the Rib River trail system. Snowmobile trailer parking exists at Bluegill Bay County Park and by Gulliver’s Landing.

Bike Trails: A variety of bicycle improvements within the Town of Rib Mountain are identified on Map 4: “Proposed Rib Mountain Bicycle and Pedestrian Routes.”

Wausau Area Bike Routes: Ten color-coded and numbered bike routes cover the Wausau area, of which three are in the Town of Rib Mountain. See Map 2 for the routes.

Routes 5, 7, 12, & MB pass through the Town of Rib Mountain. Additional information about these routes is available online at: bicyclewausau.org

Mini Parks

Mini Parks: *Generally less than 5 acres, these parks are special areas that serve a concentrated or limited population or specific group such as tots or senior citizens. One prominent feature or recreation facility like a playground may be present as the purpose of this park. The **service area** for this park **if a playground exists** generally is a ½ mile radius, and a population of 2,000-3,000 people. (See Attachment A.)*

Flax Lane Tot Lot: This 0.6 acre park has a half sized basketball court, playground, and parking lot.

Chellis Park: This 3 acre park includes both woodlands and wetlands as well as a recreation area that contains a picnic shelter, basketball court, playground, a walking trail, and an open field for unstructured play.

Neighborhood Parks

Neighborhood Parks: Centrally located spaces of 5 to 25 acres that serve as the recreational and social focus of the neighborhood are good neighborhood parks. Active and passive recreational activities in this park classification include field, court, and ball games; skating; crafts; and picnicking. Facilities may also include a playground, wading pool, ball field, multi-activity field, ball diamond, tennis courts, skatepark, and shelter. Trees, open fields, and undeveloped natural areas are also desirable components of neighborhood parks. The service area for this park generally is a 1 mile radius, and a population of 2,000-5,000 people. (See Attachment A.)

Liberty Park: This 14 acre park is owned by the Rib Mountain Sanitary District and leased to the Town of Rib Mountain for park use. Facilities include a playground, picnic shelter with grill, two parking lots, a ball diamond, basketball court, two tennis courts, 9-hole disc golf course, woodlands, and open fields for unstructured play. See **Attachment O** for this park's master plan layout.

Rib Mountain Elementary School: This school district facility includes 5 acres of outdoor recreation amenities: a playground, volleyball court, 2 tennis courts, a basketball court, and an area that can either be used as 2 baseball diamonds or a playfield and soccer field. The Town Park Commission worked with the Wausau School District to develop the school's play area to meet school and town needs.

South Mountain School: This school district facility includes 25 acres of outdoor recreation amenities: playground, ice skating area, tennis courts, baseball diamond, soccer fields, and basketball courts. The Town Park Commission worked with the Wausau School District to develop the school's play area to meet school and town needs.

River Park: *The Wisconsin River pedestrian bridge connects Town of Rib Mountain residents to this park in Rothschild.* This 5.8 acre Village of Rothschild park overlooks the Wisconsin River and is located at the corner of River and Williams Streets in Rothschild. Facilities in this park include a Little League size ball diamond, a soccer field, playground, and an open air shelter building with a concession kitchen, bike repair station, restrooms, and drinking fountain. A pedestrian trail with benches at various locations winds throughout the park and along the banks of the Wisconsin River. The pedestrian/bicycle bridge over the Wisconsin River connects the trails of the Village of Rothschild and Town of Rib Mountain. On-leash dogs are allowed in the park.

Community Parks

Community Parks: Usually more than 25 acres in size, these parks serve entire communities, and are located adjacent to a collector street to provide community-wide vehicular access. The purposes of this park are to meet the recreational needs of several neighborhoods, as well as to preserve unique landscapes and open spaces. These parks allow for group activities not feasible at the neighborhood level. All of the facilities of a neighborhood park may exist, along with nature trails and scenic areas. (See Attachment A.)

Doepke Recreation Area: This 37.35 acre (plus 30.2 acres*) park has a parking lot for about 100 cars. Features in the park include:

- An additional *30.2 acres of adjacent public land that is almost all forested wetland owned by Rib Mountain State Park and Marathon County.
- Walking trail surrounding the park with fitness stations;
- A nature trail with boardwalks through wetlands;
- Multiple playground pieces with benches around the playground area;
- Public Use Little league baseball diamond with dugouts;
- Private Use Little league baseball diamond with dugouts, bleachers, and lighting;
- Ice hockey rink and an ice skating area both with lighting;
- Soccer field;
- Reservable picnic shelter with restrooms, grill, drinking fountain, and concession kitchen;
- Sledding hill; and
- Vast wooded wetland.

Bluegill Bay County Park: This 68 acre county owned and operated park is considered a community park in addition to its county park status. See description in County Parks and Forests section.

Special Use Areas

Special Use Areas: A special use park is often designed as a revenue-generating enterprise created to satisfy demand for a particular sport, recreational activity, or special event. A special use park may also be a sports park combined with enterprise activities and administered as a community recreation resource. Various functions include special events, fairs, festivals, expositions, symposiums, sport, community gatherings, and numerous other recreational programs and activities. (See Attachment A.)

Rookery View Park: This 2 acre peninsula provides an open field to bird watch from, a boat launch that is only open for winter vehicular access to Lake Wausau, and a sandy area for kayaks to launch from onto Lake Wausau. See **Attachment O** for this park's master plan layout.

Sandy's Bark Park: This dog park has 4 acres of field, granite path, and wetland. The park has a perimeter path with fence, paved parking area, dual-gate entrance, water filler, dog waste stations, and open fetch areas.

County Park

County Parks: *A county park provides sufficient park and recreation area to meet the needs of county residents. County parks consist of land that is specifically set aside for active and passive recreation uses, and that accommodates large gatherings, special events, and individual users. County parks offer a wide variety of compatible outdoor recreation activities, and may provide areas that do not primarily serve a recreational purpose such as protected natural areas, historic areas, and special use areas. (See Attachment A.)*

Bluegill Bay County Park: This 68 acre county owned and operated park has north and south sections that are only connected by a walking and biking path.

Facilities in the **north section** (enter from Oriole Lane) include double boat launch ramps with courtesy piers to access Lake Wausau year-round, benches to view Lake Wausau, picnic area, open shelter, flush toilets, drinking fountain, sand volleyball court, and wooded walking trails to access the south section of the park.

Facilities in the **south section** (enter from Cloverland Lane) include a 75 person capacity open shelter without electricity that is reservable. Vault toilets, well water hand pump, sand volleyball court, horseshoe pits, grills and a second smaller open shelter, playground, two handicapped accessible fishing piers, parking lot, and extensive trails through the woodlands.

County Forest

County Forests: *County Forest resources should be protected from natural catastrophes such as fire, insect and disease outbreaks, and from human threats such as encroachment, over-utilization, environmental degradation and excessive development. While managed for environmental needs including watershed protection, protection and maintenance of biotic diversity, these same resources must also be managed and provide for sociological needs, including the production of raw materials for wood using industries that provide a wide variety of products fulfilling consumer demands, and provisions for recreational opportunities. (See Marathon County's County Forest Land Use Plan)*

Nine Mile County Forest: This is the crown jewel of the Marathon County forest system at just over 4,900 acres. Nine Mile is intensively managed for multiple uses including sustainable timber harvest, wildlife habitat, and a variety of outdoor recreational opportunities like hunting, hiking, mountain biking, cross-country skiing, horseback riding, snowmobiling, and snowshoeing.

There is a large formal parking area and Chalet building at the north portion of this unit, on Red Bud Road. The main trailhead starts here for a variety of uses.

The Chalet is a 175 person capacity reservable indoor pavilion. This cement block building has high, wood beamed ceilings, cement floor, seating for 95-100, a changing room, wood burner with firewood, ceiling fans, crank out windows with screens, indoor restrooms, 4 basin sink with hot & cold water, refrigerator, and a large counter area. An outdoor vault restroom located in the chalet parking lot on the west side is available

when the chalet is not open. An outdoor drinking fountain with bottle filler and a bike repair station are available on the front of the Chalet.

Within the boundaries of Nine Mile is the *Duane L. Corbin Shooting Range Park*, located off of Rifle Road, in the southern portion of this unit. This shooting range has target and trap shooting, and an archery range with elevated shooting stations.

Two streams, Black Creek and Four-Mile Creek, thread part of their way through Nine-Mile Swamp, winding through open marsh and clumps of spruce. Nearby, mixed hardwoods, oak, and pine thrive on the uplands, alternating with large stands of aspen, the principal timber crop and a major source of food and cover for ruffed grouse and deer. These game species, as well as cottontails, snowshoe hare, waterfowl, and squirrels are actively pursued by hunters. The maintenance of waterfowl reservoirs, seeding of trails, planting of food and cover shrubs, and selective cutting of trees, all help to promote vigorous game and non-game wildlife populations.

A well maintained system of trails totaling over 30 miles (45 Km) allows easy access for recreation. All trails are closed to motorized vehicles, except in winter, for designated snowmobile/ATV trails. Cross-country skiers have more than 30 Km of one-way trails over a variety of terrain with loops suitable for the novice to expert skier. In the summer, the ski trails become an excellent mountain biking trail system. Horses are allowed on the snowmobile trail during the summer only. Blackberries, blueberries, and choke cherries are eagerly sought by berry pickers in the late summer and fall.

Nine Mile Forest Unit has 10 miles of single track mountain bike trails and 20 miles on the cross country trails. All riders 12 years and older require a daily or annual pass.

Cross country ski trails are double tracked with a skating lane and are generally one-way. Almost 4 miles (6.3 km) of trails are lighted nightly until 9 pm during the ski season. There are 30 km of beginner to expert, signed and mapped trails. Rental equipment is available, annual passes are offered, and pre-season and school/group discounts are available.

Skijoring (pulled on skis by dogs) is prohibited on ski trails.

A 6.7 mile Snowshoe trail is available. Snowshoeing is not allowed on the cross country trails, a snowshoeing pass is required.

Dogs are allowed, except on groomed trails.

Blackberries, blueberries, and choke cherries are eagerly sought by berry pickers in the late summer and fall.

Camping is allowed with a permit issued in advance by the Forest Administrator.

All trails are closed to motorized vehicles, except for designated snowmobile/ATV trails.

Nine Mile Forest Unit has 10 miles of signed horseback riding trails.

Hunting and trapping are permitted, and all state regulations apply.

State Park

State Parks: *A state park, by size, program, and location, provides space for outdoor recreation and education about nature and conservation. These parks serve a significant geographic segment of a state or regional population. State parks aim to preserve, protect, interpret and enhance the scenic and cultural resources of the state. (See Attachment A.)*

Rib Mountain State Park: This quartzite hill is one of the oldest geological formations on earth. Rib Mountain State Park is a premier day-use property with picnicking, hiking trails, and reservable facilities that include a scenic amphitheater, indoor gathering space and picnic shelters. The top of the 60-foot observation tower offers spectacular views of the Wausau area and Wisconsin River.

Granite Peak Ski Area is on the north face of the mountain and offers downhill skiing and snowboarding during winter.

Hiking – There are more than 13 miles of hiking trails at Rib Mountain State Park, with over eight miles accessible to people with disabilities. Pets are permitted in the park on the trails when on an 8-foot leash.

Picnicking is very popular at Rib Mountain State Park. There are several picnic areas with tables, two playgrounds, reservable shelters and a reservable amphitheater on top of the park. Please remember pets are not permitted in the picnic areas.

Open and closed hunting and trapping areas exist throughout the park. See the park's hunting regulations for further details.

Winter Activities – There are no groomed cross-country ski trails at the park. Winter hiking and snowshoeing are allowed in most areas of the park. About 1.5 miles of club-operated snowmobile trails travel through the park, however there is no access to the trails from the park.

Chapter 4:

OUTDOOR RECREATION NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Recreational needs within the town were identified by 1) collecting public input, 2) needs driven park planning, and 3) creating a park Level of Service assessment.

4.1 Public Input

1. Informal Public Input

In the regular course of business, the Town of Rib Mountain's staff, and Park Commission members have received public input about the parks. That input and staff's professional experience will also shape what changes are implemented.

2. Input from Reference Plans & Laws

A variety of plan's goals & objectives and recommended projects that affect the Town of Rib Mountain are summarized in Chapter 1 under: "Reference Plans & Laws."

3. Town Outdoor Recreation Survey Results

In the spring of 2021, this survey was sent out for resident feedback in the Town Beat newsletter. The Town put up posters with QR codes at many parks and at a community planning event that was well attended. The survey was open for 1-month. The survey was also available via a link on the Town's website.

We received **423 responses** to the survey. This survey provides a much deeper understanding of the wants and needs for outdoor recreation than a public hearing, so the results are very valuable. Respondents could skip questions, so several questions had smaller response groups.

About 72% of respondents live in the Town of Rib Mountain.

Through an IP address analysis of who took the survey it appears that 40 IP addresses are at least duplicated, which could mean that a husband and wife both took the survey. Twelve IP address that repeated only had one response that completed the survey past Question #5 with all following questions left blank. All of those duplicate IP addresses did not have the same answers, so it appears that nobody "stuffed the ballot box."

A majority of the respondents were female (56% female, 44% male). Respondents came from all age groups, with a strong showing of at least 25% in the 25 to 40 age group, 41 to 56 age group, and the 57 to 75 age group.

The full survey results (97 pages) are available in Attachment D.









Q13. What type of park should be developed at the Municipal Center?











4.2 Needs Driven Park Planning

Since the 1960's, an accepted practice has been to adopt a uniform national land standard, such as 10 acres per 1,000 population, for park planning. A standard amount of land for parks and recreation nationwide is no longer recognized as universal for a park.

A standard land measure is still used to determine how much land is needed for a specific use like a baseball diamond. Facility standards are used for this purpose. The number of baseball diamonds and other facilities are not the same among similar sized communities nationally; therefore a Level of Service needs to be created locally.

Besides creating a Level of Service for each park classification, other measures such as geographic distribution and universal accessibility, are also used to determine the adequacy of a community's parks.

Universal accessibility is making facilities (e.g., tables, drinking fountains, and restrooms) accessible to people with limited mobility. Americans with Disabilities (ADA) standards are followed when purchasing or modifying facilities for universal accessibility. Each park and its park facilities are described in Chapter 3. If changes to park facilities are necessary to make them ADA compliant, then suggested improvements will be listed in Chapter 6 under each park's 5-year improvement table.

1. Park Design Criteria

Parks of any size are useful, but when land is set aside in subdivision plats for future parks, then the appropriate size and reason for the park needs to be established. Park design criteria become useful when deciding on a communities' *official map* (§62.23(6) *WI. Stats.*) where future parks should be.

Park design criteria is described in **Attachment A** for the full variety of park types.

Each park classification contains the following:

- Definition,
- Size Objectives;
- Service Area Objectives;
- Location Objectives;
- Space, and Design;
- Orientation; and
- Function.

Park Acreage

The size of a park is determined by two criteria:

1. Physical geography. Does the site have steep hills, woodlands, or wetlands? Such natural features are useful for exploration, conservation, aesthetic buffers, and unprogrammed buffers between uses.
2. Park facilities. *What activities are allowed or will be allowed?* This is determined by physical inventory and by asking for public input.

How much land is needed for each use? This is determined by Facility Development Standards in **Attachment B** for a large variety of activity types.

Park acreage in **Table 7** shows how the Town of Rib Mountain's park system (including schools, county parks, and neighboring community parks) compares with state standards for the size of each park as grouped by classification. Parks are listed by classification in Chapter 3.

*SCORP states that a mini park is 0.5-1.5 acres, but a gap from 1.5-5 acres exists, so that gap was added to the mini park size.

Park Design Criteria Conclusions (space within each park) – All of the Town of Rib Mountain’s parks appear to meet these criteria for space and facilities within each park, and that is why they fall into specific park categories.

- The average park sizes for the Town of Rib Mountain **are in line with** State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) recommendations for each classification per Table 7.
- Park acreages for each park are appropriate based upon the facilities identified in each park per the descriptions in Chapter 3.
- Among the developed parks in the Town of Rib Mountain, features within each park (identified in Chapter 3) have enough space to function properly, are well maintained, and have unprogrammed buffer space between uses.

2. Park Service Areas

Parks must be close to where residents live for people to consider a park useful. Just like schools, park types (mini, neighborhood, and community) are provided for each life cycle, and therefore each park type must cover every resident.

Map 5 illustrates how well Town residents are served by the various parks within and outside of the Town that serve Town residents. The State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) provides the following guidelines for park placement:

- Mini park service area: ½-mile radius, or a population of 2,000-3,000.
- Neighborhood park service area
Every neighborhood park serves **both** as a mini and a neighborhood park:
½ mile radius, or a population of 2,000-3,000, **and**
1 mile radius, or a population of 2,000-5,000.
- Elementary school grounds service area: same as *neighborhood parks*, because in the Town of Rib Mountain both elementary school grounds have the same level of

playgrounds and play areas similar to *neighborhood parks*, so their service areas are the same.

- Community park service area: 2-5 mile radius (shown on Map 5 with a neighborhood service area and a mini park service area, because they serve as neighborhood parks and as whole community parks).
- County and State park service areas are larger than the community they are located within.

Park Service Area Conclusions – Map 5 shows the park service areas and the existing and projected future housing density per the Town’s 2020 Comprehensive Plan.

Several residential areas are significantly farther away from the nearest park than what SCORP standards suggest as adequate, therefore there is a **shortage of mini parks** in the Town of Rib Mountain.

The Town of Rib Mountain is populated by two housing neighborhood types: suburban residential (less than ½ acre lots) and rural residential (1+ acre lots).

Balancing a need for parks where people live with the desire to maintain a low density residential development, means that the following adjusted park service area will apply to the Town of Rib Mountain:

- Suburban Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served now and into the future with *mini* and *neighborhood* parks. If a neighborhood is beyond the ½-mile service area of the closest *mini* park, but is not blocked from the *mini* park by the need to cross a major road (without a boulevard or crosswalk warning system), and is not further than 1-mile walking distance on roads or paths from the park, then this neighborhood is still considered served by the nearest *mini* park.
- Rural Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served by *community* parks or any other park they wish to drive to.

If additional parks are constructed per the recommendations below, then the following areas will be considered served by parks:

Area “A” on Map 5 – This area encompasses all the suburban residential development north and south of CTH NN that are west of Rib Mountain Elementary. These neighborhoods are outside the ½ mile radius from Rib Mountain Elementary by a long distance and must use (“blocked by”) CTH NN to access the school.

Recommendation A.1: Town to add at least a *mini* park on the Municipal Center grounds.

Recommendation A.2: Pursue with the County Highway Department constructing a 10-foot wide asphalt path in or alongside of the CTH NN right-of-way from the Municipal Center, west to at least Nuthatch Lane. This will extend access to the new Municipal Center park to residential areas adjacent to CTH NN.

Recommendation A.3: Work with Rib Mountain State Park to pave the existing “desire path” from Falcon Ave & Sunbird Ln to Snowbird Ln and to cross CTH NN north to access the Municipal Center.

Recommendation A.4: Future Suburban Housing Density in **Area “A”** on **Map 5** beyond Spring Brook Drive should be served by a new *mini* or *neighborhood* park soon after that housing is built.

Area “B” on Map 5 – This area encompasses all the suburban residential development west of the River Park (Rothschild) service area, and south of the Doepke Rec. Area and South Mountain Elementary service areas.

Recommendation B.1: Add at least a *mini* park in the Goldenrod Road & Woodbine Lane area.

3. Level of Service

A Level of Service (LOS) approach is used to identify if enough park land exists for a community’s needs. This revised approach is defined by the community’s needs rather than an arbitrary acreage-per-1000-people standard. The LOS is generated locally for each park classification (e.g., mini, neighborhood, or community). Public input is collected, and the needs for a particular park, or whole park classification, are determined. If the public is content with the existing parks within a park classification, then the LOS is applied to the whole population. If the public determines that individual parks need more facilities in them, then a particular park needing additional land may become reclassified into the next larger classification. When the community grows in population the LOS is used to calculate how many additional parks are needed.

Parks are listed by classification in Chapter 3.

This is the formula used in **Table 8** to create the acres per 1,000 people, which is the Level of Service (LOS):

$$\text{LOS by classification} = \frac{\text{Park acres per classification}}{(\text{Town Population} \div 1,000 \text{ population served})}$$

The Town of Rib Mountain had a 23.15 town-wide Level of Service (LOS) in 2010, which increased to 27.0 by 2020 because two parcels adjacent to Doepke Rec. Area became useful for outdoor recreation. A Rib Mountain State Park property swap created an isolated 28.8 acre parcel that DNR owns directly east of Doepke Rec. Area, and Marathon County already owned a 1.4 acre parcel next to that DNR parcel. A walking path was developed through these parcels into Doepke Rec. Area. An LOS of about 15 to 20 is what most communities aim for, but this is only one of three parts of the picture for determining if adequate parkland exists; the other two parts are space within a park (1. Park design), and location (2. Park Service Area).

Level of Service Conclusion (amount of parks for the population)


- When you take into account the school grounds and the county park, then the Town of Rib Mountain has a high amount of park acreage per resident as compared with peer communities. See **Table 9**. *Unfortunately, there is still a Park Service Area shortage of *mini* parks serving Suburban Residential areas of the Town (see page 36). **The amount of acreage dedicated solely to mini parks is low, but every park classified as either *neighborhood* or *community* has a *mini park* within it.
- Parks are located in areas that have scenic beauty and do not have physical barriers (e.g., non-connected roads, freeway, river) for neighbors to access them. For example: River Park in the Village of Rothschild connects to the Town of Rib Mountain over the Wisconsin River pedestrian bridge, and therefore counts as providing park coverage to some residents in the Town of Rib Mountain.



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Chapter 5:

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The development of an efficient outdoor recreation plan depends upon establishing specific recreation and open-space goals and objectives from public participation and Park Commission revision and refinement. These goals and objectives are meant to guide Town officials as they work towards providing a recreation system to meet the needs of the Town of Rib Mountain's residents and visitors over the next 5 years.

Goal 1 – Provide facilities for bicycle and pedestrian use.

Objectives

1. Continue creating paved off-road paths for walking and bicycling.
2. Cooperate with County Highway Department to improve bicycle accommodations on all county highways in the Town of Rib Mountain.
3. Continue installing sidewalk connections along and across Rib Mountain Drive and related commercial areas.
4. Consider making all roads classified as collectors or arterials pedestrian and bicycle friendly. Many main roads in the Town do not have a safe place to walk or bike outside of the travel lane.
5. Encourage each employer in Town to install bicycle parking.
6. Work with DNR and others to increase mountain biking on Granite Peak and in Rib Mountain State Park.
7. Cooperate with various groups (e.g., CWOCC, Marathon County Parks Dept., and others) to help implement their bicycling improvement plans.
8. Support winter fat tire biking in the Town of Rib Mountain.

Goal 2 – Improve water access throughout the Town.

Objectives

1. Mark public water access points within the Town (e.g., 6 points along the Wisconsin River).
2. Develop kayak launch within an existing park in the Town. This launch could be at Gulliver's Landing, Rookery, or Bluegill Bay County Park.
3. Protect shore fishing areas on Wisconsin River by restricting boat traffic near pier. Placing "boats keep out" buoys near shore and dock fishing sites would reinforce the regulation.

Goal 3 – Maintain the existing quality park level of service as the community grows.

Objectives

1. Continue improving Doepke Recreation Area to maintain it as a premier community park.
2. Consider creating a second premier community park since Doepke Recreation Area is at capacity.
3. Consider developing a swimming beach, pool, or splash pad.
4. Continue utilizing and exploring additional opportunities to work with other public and private entities for services. This includes working with the county and state parks within the Town, and with other organizations that may want to host events or build recreation facilities that may fit within existing parks.
5. Continue to add parks to serve new residential developments.
 - 5 a. Suburban Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served now and into the future with *mini* and *neighborhood* parks. If a neighborhood is beyond the ½-mile service area of the closest *mini* park, but is not blocked from the *mini* park by the need to cross a major road (without a boulevard or crosswalk warning system), and is not further than 1-mile walking distance on roads or paths from the park, then this neighborhood is still considered served by the nearest *mini* park.
 - 5 b. Rural Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served by *community* parks or any other park they wish to drive to.

Chapter 6:

RECOMMENDATIONS & CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Recommendations & Capital Improvements are ways for satisfying issues identified during the planning process, which included citizen input, Park & Recreation Committee member ideas, and staff analysis throughout all the preceding chapters. Although it is unlikely that all recommendations presented in this plan will be undertaken in the next five years, they should be recognized as causes for action as the opportunity or need arises.

There are a variety of strategies available for implementing this plan. Chapter 7 provides a wide variety of implementation techniques to use. By using the following recommendations, and implementation techniques in Chapter 7, the Town of Rib Mountain can improve and preserve outdoor recreation for current residents and future generations.

This chapter is divided into the following sections:

6.1 General Recommendations – Town-wide strategies and policies.

6.2 Individual Park Capital Improvements – Physical construction projects.

6.1 General Recommendations

Several issues came to light through the results of the community survey, staff analysis, and Committee meetings.

Each recommendation has a suggested timeframe:

- **Short-term (6 months-2 years)** – Projects that can be implemented without the need for specific grant funds or large coordinative efforts.
- **Medium-term (2-3 years)** – Projects that may require some planning to include in the Town's CIP or would be eligible for upcoming grant cycles.
- **Long-term (possibly longer than 5 years)** – Projects that require a more coordinated effort, design time, or are beyond the current budget of a community.

Adopt an updated Official Map

The Town of Rib Mountain's 2020 Comprehensive Plan has goals in 2 chapters imploring the Town to update and adopt a revised *official map* defined in Sec. 62.23(6) Wis. Stats. An *official map* is used to eliminate development from occurring where future parks, pathways, and other community facilities are planned to go to preserve buildable space and reduce acquisition costs. An official map may be amended to move a park so that a housing development can fit an area, but then the Town can require just compensation (an equivalent amount of buildable land) to move the park.

(Short-term)

Recommendation A: Add future park locations and future path locations to the Town's *official map*.

Doepke Recreation Area

Doepke Recreation Area receives extensive use by Town residents and many people also consider it a regional park due to its draw of users from a variety of other municipalities.

Recreational Pressure:

- Parking can be an issue on weekends and during special events. Expanded parking is necessary.

Where is this demand coming from? Large events (e.g., shelter rental, baseball, or soccer) are pushing the parking over the existing lot capacity.

(Short-term)

Recommendation 1: Explore how to develop parking in hockey rink area for summer use and flooding for hockey rink in winter.

- Regarding playground equipment usage, there are many times when the playground is beyond capacity. The small child swings are always busy. Kids are waiting in line to use the swings, and seating for parents is non-existent (due to kids using them while they wait). Advertising the playground at South Mountain Elementary has not reduced Doepke playground usage.

(Short-term)

Recommendation 2: Instead of adding another playground in Doepke Rec. Area, consider adding a playground at the Town of Rib Mountain Municipal Center and a mini park in the Goldenrod Road / Woodbine Lane area.

(Short-term)

Recommendation 3: Add benches inside playground fence.

- Lack of shelter, shade, and picnic accommodations.

Doepke Recreation Area is currently designed only for sporting events and active recreation. There is no covered outdoor seating within Doepke Rec. Area. Liberty Park has a picnic shelter and Bluegill Bay County Park has two picnic shelters.

(Short-term)

Recommendation 4: Consider adding covered picnic tables around Doepke Recreation Area.

Bone and Joint Trail

On the eastern base of Rib Mountain State Park is the Bone and Joint Trail that connects some street parking with the Rib Mountain State Park multi-use path that goes to the top of Rib Mountain State Park. Parking at the Mountain’s base has been expanded and is still not enough for the high volume of users – both during the day and on weekends.

(Short-term)

Recommendation: Extend the CTH R asphalt multi-use path along the driveway to access Immanuel Baptist Church’s (IBC) parking lot, which is available for public parking when there are no church services. See potential multi-use path design in **Attachment K**.

Bicycle Parking

For bikes to be used more often for transportation, everyday destinations like work, school, stores, offices, and restaurants must be within a convenient biking distance and have bicycle parking. Many Town destinations are within biking distance of many residents, but many destinations don’t have bike racks.

Bicycle rack design guidelines in **Attachment J** are a good start for anyone wanting to provide bicycle parking now that accommodates a variety of bicycle types.

(Short-term)

Recommendation A: The Town should lead by example by installing bicycle racks at all parks and at the Municipal Center.

(Long-term)

Recommendation B: Encourage employers of all types to install bicycle parking.

County Park Signs

Bluegill Bay Park does not have any signs on Rib Mountain Drive. There are two unconnected entrances to Bluegill Bay Park, with only one entrance leading to the boat launch.

(Short-term)

Recommendation: Ask the County to install one set of brown colored highway grade signs on Rib Mountain Drive for both county park entrances. A boat launch symbol should be added to the set of new park signs leading to the **north section** of the park, and a “no boat launch access” or a boat launch symbol with a line through it should be added to the signs leading to the **south section** to show that there is no access to the boat launch from the south.

Aquatic Center

Swimming was the 8th most popular outdoor recreation activity with 42% of the 2021 ORP Survey respondents. After paved bike trails (59 responses) and mountain bike trails (47 respondents), creating a swimming area in Town was the 3rd most popular recreational opportunity that should be developed in Town per the 2021 ORP Survey (44 responses). Comments mentioned pool (20 responses), swimming beach (13 responses), splash pad (7 responses), and aquatic center (4 responses).

(Short-term)

Recommendation: Consider financially partnering with either or both the Weston Aquatic Center and the Rothschild/Schofield Aquatic Center to provide annual “resident” discounted passes to Town of Rib Mountain residents.

Marking Public Water Access Sites

Public access points to state waters are required with land subdivisions along rivers and lakes (per §236.16(3) WI Stats.). There are a few types of public access points to waterbodies such as boat launches, canoe access, and unimproved spots. All of these access points are free and open to the public, so they should be identified for everyone to find.

(Medium-term)

Recommendation: Continue installing a physical marker at each access point. See potential marker designs and potential marker locations on each parcel in **Attachment I** titled: “Potential Public Water Access Marker Designs.” Also, an address number should be posted along the road and along the water for each access point.

Rib Mountain Bike & Pedestrian Plan Improvements

The Town of Rib Mountain has mapped a number of short and long-term trail (off-street and route on-street) bikeway improvements that was updated in 2020. The Town uses this map to budget annually for improvements, so updating this map with Outdoor Recreation Plan recommendations is important to keep it current.

(Short to Long-term)

Recommendation: Continue to implement and amend the bicycle and pedestrian improvements shown on Map 4: “Proposed Rib Mountain Bicycle and Pedestrian Routes.”

Establish New Parks *(Long-term)*

Needs Driven Park Planning on pages 36 & 37 identified where deficiencies in the park system exist.

Balancing a need for parks where people live with the desire to maintain a low density residential development, means that the following adjusted park service area will apply to the Town of Rib Mountain:

- Suburban Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served now and into the future with *mini* and *neighborhood* parks. If a neighborhood is beyond the ½-mile service area of the closest *mini* park, but is *not blocked* from the *mini* park by the need to cross a major road (without a boulevard or crosswalk warning system), and

is not further than 1-mile walking distance on roads or paths from the park, then this neighborhood is still considered served by the nearest *mini* park.

- Rural Residential areas (Map 5) will continue to be served by *community* parks or any other park they wish to drive to.

Area “A” on Map 5 – This area encompasses all the suburban residential development north and south of CTH NN that are west of Rib Mountain Elementary. These neighborhoods are outside the ½ mile radius from Rib Mountain Elementary by a long distance and must use (“blocked by”) CTH NN to access the school.

Recommendation A.1: Town to add at least a *mini* park on the Municipal Center grounds.

Recommendation A.2: Pursue with the County Highway Department constructing a 10-foot wide asphalt path in or alongside of the CTH NN right-of-way from the Municipal Center, west to at least Nuthatch Lane.

Recommendation A.3: Work with Rib Mountain State Park to pave the existing “desire path” from Barred Owl Ave & Sunbird Ln to Snowbird Ln and to cross CTH NN north to access the Municipal Center.

Recommendation A.4: Future Suburban Housing Density in **Area “A” on Map 5** beyond Spring Brook Drive should be served by a new *mini* or *neighborhood* park soon after that housing is built.

Area “B” on Map 5 – This area encompasses all the suburban residential development west of the River Park (Rothschild) service area, and south of the Doepke Recreation Area and South Mountain Elementary service areas.

Recommendation B.1: Add at least a *mini* park in the Goldenrod Road & Woodbine Lane area.

Create a park at the Municipal Center

The 2021 ORP Survey asked what type of park should be developed at the Municipal Center: Active (79 responses), Neighborhood (69 responses), None (62 responses), Senior (36 responses), and 19 people marked Other.

A park could be designed to have a neighborhood feel with elements of active sports and senior amenities. Right now, only a playground could be developed due to the limited land available. There is no room for a small ball field or multi-activity field. Since limited land exists at the Municipal Center, then if land becomes available, at least 4-acres should be acquired.

(Long-term)

Recommendation: Develop a *neighborhood* park at the Municipal Center by acquiring at least 4-acres. Facilities to potentially develop include a playground, ball field, multi-activity field, open-air picnic shelter with restrooms, walking path, and some fitness equipment for a wide range of abilities. See **Attachment G** for sample playground styles.

County Highway KK – Multi-Use Path

CTH KK has 5-foot asphalt paved shoulders on both sides and is well used by bicyclists. After two bicyclist deaths along this road, the community wants a safer way to ride their bikes generally in the CTH KK area.

(Long-term)

Recommendation A: Work with the Marathon County Highway Department to construct a 10-foot wide asphalt path along one side of CTH KK from South Mountain Road to Foxglove Road.

(Short-term)

Recommendation B: Amend the Wausau MPO Bike & Pedestrian Plan to include an asphalt path on CTH KK per Recommendation A.

(Short-term)

Recommendation C: Amend the Rib Mountain Area Bike and Pedestrian Route Long-Range Plan to include an asphalt path on CTH KK per Recommendation A.

Trillium Trail Multi-Use Path

Families with children and less adventurous bicyclists would prefer to use this potential multi-use path vs. riding on CTH KK. This alternative would be in addition to continuing to allow riding on CTH KK.

(Long-term)

Recommendation: Continue to work with willing landowners to establish an easement for a multi-use path along the east bank of the Wisconsin River (see **Attachment M**). Review the Town of Rib Mountain Area Bike and Pedestrian Route Long-Range Plan for any revisions.

Rib Mountain Drive Area Sidewalks

Walking is by far the most popular outdoor activity in Wisconsin. The 2021 ORP Survey results show *walking for pleasure* as having 86% of survey respondents enjoying it.

(Long-term)

Recommendation A: Continue to install sidewalks on both sides of Rib Mountain Drive where there is right-of-way to do so.

(Long-term)

Recommendation B: Cooperate with retail properties in the Rib Mountain Drive area to connect private sidewalks to adjacent properties and to connect with the Town's sidewalks. See sample of sidewalk fixes in **Attachment H**.

Bicycling Pinch Points

With strong support for bicycling in the Town of Rib Mountain per the 2021 ORP Survey, there are some “pinch points” to fix. The following roads connect residents north and south of STH 29 with CTH KK and the new Trillium Trail.

(Long-term)

Recommendation A: Continue paving at least 6-foot wide asphalt shoulders along the following roads:

- Lilac Avenue.
- Lakeshore Drive where it becomes a “collector road” from Lilac Ave to Azalea Rd.
- Azalea Road from Lakeshore Dr to Foxglove Rd.

(Short-term)

Recommendation B: Amend the Wausau MPO Bike & Pedestrian Plan to include wide paved shoulders on the roads listed in Recommendation A.

(Short-term)

Recommendation C: Amend the Rib Mountain Area Bike and Pedestrian Route Long-Range Plan to include wide paved shoulders on the roads listed in Recommendation A.

Pave Wide Shoulders for Bicycle & Pedestrian Use

People live in the Town of Rib Mountain because they want to have urban amenities but still feel like they live in nature, so not many curbs or sidewalks exist in residential areas.

Traffic volumes are low on most residential streets in the Town of Rib Mountain, so no sidewalks or paths are recommended along most residential streets.

Traffic volumes on all the *principal arterial* roads, *minor arterial* roads (e.g., NN), and *collector* roads (e.g., CTH KK, Lilac Ave, and Lake Shore Dr) are almost all too high to accommodate bicycles and pedestrians without paved shoulders.

(Long-term)

Recommendation: Add at least 5-foot (6-foot or off-street path is better) asphalt paved shoulders to all roads within the Town of Rib Mountain that are functionally classified as: principal arterial, minor arterial, or collector.

IMBA Ride Center *(Long-term)*

The Town of Rib Mountain is at the center of a variety of potential mountain biking facilities that would make the Wausau area an IMBA Ride Center. The CWOCC chapter of IMBA (International Mountain Biking Association) created a long range plan for mountain biking in the Wausau area, and presented it to a variety of groups in the summer of 2013. Generally, the recommendations below are parts of this long range plan, or were recently discussed, that could be implemented in the Town of Rib Mountain.

The following infrastructure is recommended to support a local bicycling public, along with creating an official IMBA Ride Center, which would be a large tourism draw:

Bicycle Parking

Recommendation: Installing bike racks in each park to provide secure parking for residents and visitors. A set of bicycle parking recommendations from the Association of Pedestrian and Bicycle Professionals (APBP) is included in **Attachment J**. The amount of space needed for a bike rack, and how to determine good bike rack designs are included in those guidelines.

Bike-friendly Lodging

Recommendation: Promote all short-term lodging in the Town of Rib Mountain to become bike friendly per Ride Center Evaluation Criteria:

“Hotels, motels, or campgrounds must have bike washes, secure bike storage, and/or allow bikes in rooms. At least 25% of available rooms/sites are to be bicycle friendly within the region near the Ride Center.”

NCWRPC Note: A bicycle wash should just use standard municipal water pressure when designating an area to wash bikes. High pressured wash stations could cause damage by forcing abrasives into bike bearings.

Granite Peak Ski Area

Recommendation: Officially recommend that mountain bicycling trails become an allowed use of the Granite Peak Ski Area.

Trail Type: Gravity based flow trail for all ability levels and advanced downhill trails. Lift served and base trail (ride up) access. Freeride Park.

Rib Mountain State Park

Recommendation: Officially recommend that mountain bicycling trails become an allowed use in Rib Mountain State Park.

Trail Types: Flow trail and XC trail.

Rib Mountain to Nine Mile Recreation Area

Recommendation: Cooperate with various land owners and CWOCC to design and establish an off-road scenic walking and biking link between Rib Mountain State Park & Granite Peak Ski Area to Nine Mile Recreation area. This link may occur along the southern border of Rib Mountain State Park via easements on private property and possibly Town roads.

Trail Type: XC trail for all ability levels and/or multi-use trail for hiking/biking

Town of Rib Mountain Loop of Multi-Use Paths

The survey done for this ORP shows overwhelming support for more multi-use paths in the Town of Rib Mountain. Residents have used the paved multi-use asphalt path along CTH R, and now want one along CTH NN and along South Mountain Road.

(Long-term)

Recommendation A: Work with the Marathon County Highway Department to construct a 10-foot wide asphalt path along one side of:

- CTH NN from Hummingbird Road to Red Wing Road; and
- South Mountain Road from Bittersweet Road to Thornapple Road.

(Short-term)

Recommendation B: Amend the Wausau MPO Bike & Pedestrian Plan to include asphalt paths on CTH NN and South Mountain Road per Recommendation A.

(Short-term)

Recommendation C: Amend the Town of Rib Mountain Area Bike and Pedestrian Route Long-Range Plan to include asphalt paths on CTH NN and South Mountain Road per Recommendation A.

(Long-term)

Recommendation D: Cooperate with Marathon County to adopt an ordinance to create and post a new bike route around Rib Mountain State Park. The loop would include CTH NN, Hummingbird Trail, CTH N, Thornapple Road, and Whippoorwill Road. Only a marked bike route would exist on Thronapple Road, and Whippoorwill Road due to low traffic volumes on those roads. Further analysis of hills, turns, and amount of solid yellow centerline (no passing zones) may dictate a wide paved shoulder or off-road path along Thornapple Road and Whippoorwill Road.

6.2 Capital Improvements, 2022-2026

Capital improvements to parks are the addition of labor and materials that improve the overall value and usefulness of that park. Routine maintenance is considered the normal cycle of repair and upkeep for existing facilities and is traditionally funded through the Town's operations budget.

See the Town of Rib Mountain’s current outdoor recreation Capital Improvement Program in **Attachment N**.

Projects listed below and in Attachment N are subject to receiving Town budgetary approval or private group fundraising. All listed projects may not be completed over the next 5-years.

General Improvements

- A. When replacing or adding bike racks at parks and the Town of Rib Mountain Municipal Center, purchase racks that meet the bike rack design guidance identified in **Attachment J**.
- B. Consider purchasing land in the Mosinee Hill area, and along the Wisconsin River for Trillium Trail development (**Attachment M**), and a possible “Area B” park (Map 5).
- C. Consider purchasing up to 4-acres adjacent to the Town of Rib Mountain Municipal Center to possibly develop a *neighborhood* level park (see recommendation).
- D. Consider purchasing additional acreage beyond Spring Brook Drive in the “Area A” for a possible second new park; as the first new park in “Area A” would be by the Municipal Center (Map 5, and “Establish New Parks” recommendation).
- E. Consider purchasing additional acreage adjacent to Liberty Park to expand that park.
- F. Consider accepting donation of land for parks throughout the Town per the approval of the Town Board.
- G. Consider adding a kayak launch at Gulliver’s Landing and across from Liberty Park.

See the Town of Rib Mountain’s current outdoor recreation Capital Improvement Program in **Attachment N**.

Chapter 7:

IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES

There are a variety of strategies available for implementing this plan. These strategies include using land use tools and government programs to realize attainment of this plan's goals and objectives.

Shoreland Zoning

Wisconsin's Shoreland Management Program established statewide minimum standards for shoreland development. Counties are required to adopt and administer shoreland zoning ordinances that meet or exceed these minimum requirements. The statewide minimum standards for county shoreland zoning ordinances are found in Chapter NR 115, Wis. Admin. Code. Marathon County administers the zoning within Rib Mountain.

Public Access to Waterways

Rib Mountain is part of Marathon County's Subdivision Ordinance, and the County administers the ordinance. State regulations for subdivisions require dedication of public access when the land along waterways is platted.

LAKE AND STREAM SHORE PLATS [236.16(3) WISCONSIN STATUTES]

- (a) All subdivisions abutting on a navigable lake or stream shall provide public access at least 60 feet wide providing access to the low watermark so that there will be public access, which is connected to existing public roads, at not more than one-half mile intervals as measured along the lake or stream shore except where greater intervals and wider access is agreed upon by the department of natural resources and the department, and excluding shore areas where public parks or open-space streets or roads on either side of a stream are provided.

NR 1.93 Access in platted subdivisions. Under s.236.16 (3), Wis. Stats., the DNR has authority to recommend wider access at less frequent intervals than are prescribed in the statutes. The DNR shall consider waiver of the 60-foot access requirement only where the DNR determines:

- (1) It will be advantageous to public interests in navigable water;
- (2) Adequate space for access users and adequate buffering for private property is assured by access wider than 60 feet where possible; and
- (3) The access that would result provides an equal or greater opportunity for public access than would be provided by dedication at statutorily prescribed intervals and the 60-foot width.

Park Dedication

Subdivision regulations can be used to require residential land subdividers to dedicate a portion of subdivided land for permanent park and open space use. Neighborhood parks may be acquired in this manner in newly developing residential areas. Local landowners should also be encouraged to dedicate land to their communities for

recreational uses. Numerous small town memorial parks have been acquired through the generosity of local citizens. If citizens are made aware of community needs, this form of private action may continue to enrich the public resources of some communities.

Conservation Subdivisions

Conservation subdivisions are characterized by common open space and clustered compact lots. A variety of housing types or the same type of housing may be allowed. The purpose of a conservation subdivision is to protect farmland or natural resource open spaces while allowing for the maximum number of residences under current community zoning and subdivision regulations. In some cases a greater density (density bonus) may be offered in the local ordinance to encourage this approach. Generally, this tool is used for parcels 40 acres and larger, or where the community maps natural resource corridors or natural features that they want to preserve. A conservation subdivision maintains the same level of overall density as a conventional subdivision, but individual lot sizes are smaller, and the community receives open space.

Use of Easements

Open space and public recreation use of private land may be acquired by easement. With an easement, certain rights are granted to the public for a specific period of time and the private owner is compensated for that public use. In purchasing an easement, the public body acquires a right either to use the land in a specific manner or to restrict the use to which an owner may put their land. For example, the rights to establish public hiking or fishing access to a waterway may be purchased through an easement.

Leases

Leases may be used as measures to use or protect land until more permanent measures may be found. By leasing parcels of land, the land remains on the village's tax rolls and can be renegotiated or non-renewed by the property owner if the monetary prospects for another use proves overpowering.

Another leasing method involves outright purchase of land by the village. The village then leases the land to a private party or organization with use restrictions placed on the land. Under this method, the village receives some monetary return on its investment and retains control over the use of the land.

Program Costs

A community should carefully watch operations and maintenance costs when setting up a parks program. A too ambitious acquisition and/or development program can easily lead to annual costs larger than the community can afford to meet. Recreation facilities like golf courses and swimming pools, for example, require large annual maintenance investments to continue.

Capital Improvements

Community officials should develop five year capital improvements programs for recreation that reflect implementation of proposals made in their plans and the priorities they place on them. To be functional, the program must be flexible and be subjected to annual review.

In developing a recreation program, care should be taken that the annual cost of maintenance does not exceed an amount the community can afford to pay. Too often,

an ambitious program can lose community support as a result of prohibitive maintenance costs.

Monetary Aid Programs

State and federal financial and technical aid programs are designed to assist communities with meeting recreational needs. A list of these programs exists in **Attachment C**.

The Stewardship Fund is a state provided comprehensive aid program for the promotion of resource conservation and outdoor recreation opportunities. It consists of several state and federal aid programs such as Local Park Aids and LAWCON, combined with new programs, such as the Urban Rivers Program. **Attachment C** gives an explanation of the Stewardship Program. For additional information go online to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

A requirement for application to the Stewardship Fund is for the local community to have a DNR approved comprehensive outdoor recreation plan. The Outdoor Recreation Plan is designed to meet that requirement. For additional information contact:

Besides state and federal aid programs, there are other sources of funding such as private foundations, trust funds, and civic and recreation organizations.

Lifetime Activities

Community and school officials responsible for recreation should place greater emphasis on land areas and facilities that can support "lifetime" recreational activities. Falling into this category are activities like golf, tennis, all target sports, horseshoes, cross country skiing, skating, running, volleyball, handball, badminton, back packing, and canoeing. Many schools have programs aimed at teaching recreational activities that people can participate in for a lifetime.

Winter Activities

All communities should provide winter outdoor recreation facilities. Skating and sliding sports (sledding, tobogganing, and skiing) can generally be provided without large investments. Skating, for example, can be as involved as providing rinks for ice hockey or as simple as flooding a small area of a school playground. Likewise, merely blocking off a lightly traveled street with a suitable slope can frequently provide a sliding area.

Specialized Facilities

Encourage development of specialized facilities by the private sector. Specialized facilities such as golf clubs, intensive use ATV areas, and ski resorts can be an important adjunct to public recreational facilities. Quality and availability for public use should be emphasized.

Municipal and School District Cooperation

Promote cooperation between municipalities and school districts in meeting recreational needs. With good planning, cooperation may take the form of joint land acquisition and/or facilities development cost sharing. Increased municipal use of existing school facilities during non-school hours should also be encouraged.

Senior Citizen Involvement

Involve senior citizens in community park development and beautification, and provide recreational facilities for their use. Although senior citizens often compose a significant proportion of the total community's population, they are often neglected in recreational planning. Benches placed near neighborhood parks and play areas and non-intensive sports facilities such as horseshoe pits located in community parks help to provide a place for the senior citizens. Small, passive use parks and gardens located near nursing and retirement homes should also be encouraged. In addition, senior citizens can provide invaluable assistance in beautifying parks and open spaces and can thereby become more involved in community group life.

Service Group Involvement

Involve organized service groups in park and recreation development, including development of competitive sports areas and neighborhood parks. Traditionally, service groups and recreation organizations, such as Lions Club, V.F.W., softball leagues, and snowmobile clubs have played an active role in the development of such facilities. Continued volunteerism of this type should be encouraged. In addition, service groups could help to meet the need for neighborhood facilities by supplementing municipal financial resources by providing organization and volunteer labor.

Community Beautification

All communities should recognize that community appearance is an important component of a recreation program. Maintained streets and sidewalks, attractive trees and shrubs, well cared for homes and commercial buildings, and neatly landscaped home lawns, public open space, and parks are principal contributors to community beautification. Such a program is most rewarding to persons engaged in passive recreation.

Adopt-A-Park Program

A program which encourages local groups to adopt-a-park or segment of trail or stream could be organized similar to the very successful *Adopt a Highway* program. The groups could volunteer their time to maintain and beautify the county's recreational system, allowing more county funds to provide major improvements.

Park Design and Location Criteria

This section is presented in the interest of assisting park and recreation agencies in the development of a system of parks and recreation areas. A recreation system is composed of many different components, the combination of which provide facilities and landscapes for outdoor recreation. Many entities are involved in the development and management of recreational areas and facilities for a community or region. Facilities provided by these entities should be complementary and serve a particular geographic area or recreational need. For this plan, parks and recreation areas have been classified on the basis of their service areas. They are described as the following:

▪ Mini Park	▪ School Park
▪ Neighborhood Park	▪ County Park
▪ Community Park	▪ State Park
▪ Special Use Park	▪ State Forest

Mini Park

1. Definition Summary:

A play lot or playground provides space for parental supervised recreation of toddlers and young children within a neighborhood, or as part of a larger neighborhood or community park and urban center, including retail shopping areas.

2. Size Objectives:

0.5 to 1.5 acres.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Generally within a neighborhood of a half mile radius or population of 2,000-3,000. Mini parks may be included in parks that serve a larger population or service area.

4. Location Objectives:

Located in protected areas with separation from street traffic and high visibility; serving local neighborhoods and adjoining schools, libraries, or police and fire facilities.

- Population Ratio to Acreage: 0.25 to 0.5 acre per 1,000 population to achieve a park unit size that serves 2,000 to 3,000 people.

5. Space, Design, and Service Area:

The size of a play lot or playground may range from as small as 2,500 sq. ft. to 1.5 acres.* Amenities offered by these facilities generally include sand play areas, play apparatus, play equipment, and other special child-oriented features. The service radius for these parks in

terms of distance from population served is limited to less than a quarter mile, or within a super block space, unless the playground is incorporated into a larger park. (*Stand-alone play lots require more land area than play lots incorporated into larger parks.)

6. Orientation:

Small geographic areas, sub-neighborhoods, or neighborhoods, when combined with a larger park unit, serves youth ranging in age from toddler to 12 years, with adult supervision. Playgrounds also serve important needs in city business districts and inner city areas where a mix of commercial and recreation activity is desired.

7. Function:

Provides outdoor play experiences for youth under parental supervision. Generates neighborhood communication and provides diversion from work and domestic chores. Promotes neighborhood solidarity.

Neighborhood Park

1. Definition Summary:

A neighborhood park, by size, program, and location, provides space and recreation activities for the immediate neighborhood in which it is located. It is considered an extension of neighborhood residents' "out-of-yard" and outdoor use area.

2. Size Objectives:

5 to 25 acres.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Generally a one mile radius, but actually defined by collector street patterns which form the limits of a neighborhood or recreation service area. Population served may range from 2,000 up to 5,000.

4. Location Objectives:

Centrally located for equitable pedestrian access within a definable neighborhood service area. Adjoining or adjacent to an elementary school, middle school, high school, fire station, or library, if possible.

5. Program Objectives:

Compatible with the neighborhood setting and park site constraints. Generally includes the following facilities, which are determined with public input as to use and activities:

- a. Parking for 10 to 20 vehicles.
 - 1) On-street parking is acceptable if negative impact to residential units can be mitigated. On-site parking is preferable as a planning objective.
 - 2) Bike racks with Class II trail connections where possible.
- b. Restrooms
 - 1) Men's restroom with 2 water closets, 2 urinals, 2 lavatories.
 - 2) Women's restroom with 3 water closets and 2 lavatories.
 - 3) Utility and minimum park janitorial storage space.
- c. Tot lot/children's play area
- d. Family event/group picnic facility
- e. Informal family picnic area with benches and tables
- f. Unstructured turf grass play area/play or practice field for children, young adults, and families.
- g. Sport facilities—compatible with neighborhood setting and park site constraints.
 - 1) Basketball—half court, full court, or tri-court configuration
 - 2) Volleyball area
 - 3) Softball field/soccer practice or game overlay
 - 4) Other features as needs or site conditions allow

6. Orientation:

Serves all age groups, with an emphasis on youth and families in neighborhood settings.

7. Function:

To provide a combination of active recreation and passive activities, both outdoor and indoor facilities and special features as required or needed.

8. Space, Design and Service Area:

A minimum size of 5 to 25 acres with amenities including sports facilities, picnic areas, swim facilities, cultural activities, arts, crafts, and individual passive activities. The park should primarily serve a defined neighborhood area population of 2,000-5,000. Distance from this neighborhood will vary depending on urban development pattern, zoning, and densities in the respective neighborhoods being served. Efforts should be made to allow easy pedestrian access to the park.

Community Park

1. Definition Summary:

A community park, by size, program, and location, provides space and recreation activities for a defined service area, the entire city, or significant geographic segment of the city's population.

2. Size Objectives:

Usually more than 25 acres.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Generally a 2 to 5 mile radius within the city and adjacent neighborhoods outside of city limits.

4. Location Objectives:

Centrally located if planned to serve a particular geographic segment of the city. Located adjoining or immediately adjacent to a collector street providing community-wide vehicular access, thereby reducing neighborhood traffic impacts. Connected with Class II on-street and/or off-street community trail and bike lane system. Adjoining or adjacent to an elementary, middle, or high school if possible.

5. Program Objectives

Elements that fulfill the service area, park facilities and recreation program demands. The following facilities may be compatible with community setting and park site constraints:

- a. Off-street parking calculated to satisfy demand of park and recreation activities provided. Includes bike racks and a public transit station at the site as well as both on-site and street parking.
- b. Restrooms designed to accommodate the level of park and recreation activities provided and the number of people served. Restrooms should be located within a reasonable walking distance from children's play equipment and other high-use areas.
- c. Community recreation center
- d. Park maintenance and equipment storage building
- e. Tot lot/children's play area
- f. Group picnic shelters
- g. Family picnic facilities
- h. Sport/recreation facility fulfilling the overall city demand

Appropriate program elements include:

- 1) Community pool/water feature
- 2) Soccer fields
- 3) Softball, little league baseball, junior pony league baseball
- 4) Football
- 5) Roller hockey/skateboard area
- 6) Tennis courts
- 7) Basketball courts
- 8) Amphitheater/performing arts center
- 9) Volleyball (indoor and outdoor)
- 10) Jogging trails
- 11) Other facilities as desired and as permitted under park site plan
- 12) Concessions (food and beverage)

6. Orientation:

Multi-purpose service area or community-wide recreation resource serving most or all of the population.

7. Function:

Provides opportunities for a diverse mix of indoor and outdoor recreation, including walking and bicycling, outdoor performances, various programmed and non-

programmed field sports, swimming, and special events.

8) Space, Design, and Service Area:

The minimum space for a community park is 15 acres. Facilities typically provide for some sports activities, through emphasis is on passive cultural and community centers with recreational programming and organized activities. The community park may serve populations within a 2 to 5 mile radius, a scope that would allow residents of other communities to use the park as well.

Special Use Park

1. Definition Summary:

A special use park is often designed as a revenue-generating enterprise created to satisfy demand for a particular sport, recreational activity, or special event. A special use park may also be a sports park combined with enterprise activities and administered as a community recreation resource.

2. Size Objective:

The actual size of a special use park is determined by land availability and facility/market demand for special uses or recreation programs.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Community or area-wide and determined by the type of recreation program, special events or use activities.

4. Location Objectives:

Determined by the property opportunity, service area and size objectives.

5. Program Objectives:

Special use parks require facility programming that is user- or market-driven and based on community needs or economic and service principles for public and private partnerships. The magnitude and type of special use facilities may include:

- a. Water play park
- b. Amphitheater
- c. Festival/swap meet/farmers market
- d. League/individual sports complex
- e. Fitness/entertainment center
- f. Skateboard/in-line hockey park

g. Recreation programs and classes

6. Orientation:

Provides recreation programming, sports and special event attractions and activities for all age groups.

7. Function:

Special events, fairs, festivals, expositions, symposiums, sports, community gatherings, ethnic/cultural celebrations, plays and numerous other recreational programs and activities.

8. Space, Design, and Service Area:

The minimum size for special parks varies depending on intended use and programming.

School Park

1. Definition Summary:

By combining the resources of two public agencies, the school park classification allows for expanding the recreational, social, and educational opportunities available to the community in an efficient and cost-effective manner.

Depending on the circumstances, school park sites often complement other community recreation or open lands. As an example, an elementary/middle school site could also serve as a neighborhood park. Likewise, middle or high school sports facilities could do double duty as a community park or as youth athletic fields. Depending on its size, one school park site may serve in a number of capacities, such as a neighborhood park, youth athletic fields, and a location for recreation classes. Given the inherent variability of type, size and location, determining how a school park site is integrated into a larger park system will depend on case-by-case circumstances. The important outcome in the joint-use relationship is that both the school district and park system benefit from shared use of facilities and land area.

2. Size Objective

The optimum size of a school park site depends on its intended use. The size criteria

established for neighborhood park and community park classifications may apply.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Neighborhood park and community park classifications criteria should be used to determine school park functions and area served. For planning purposes, the degree to which school lands, including building or facilities, meet community needs depends on the specific inter-local agreements formed.

4. Location Objectives:

The location of a school park site will be determined by the school district based on district policy. Coordinated city and school district planning allows for siting, acquisition, and facility development to be responsive to community needs. Service areas for school park sites will depend on the type of use and facilities provided.

5. Program Objectives:

The criteria established for neighborhood parks and community parks should be used to determine how a school park site is developed and programmed. If athletic fields are developed at a school park site, they should, where feasible, be oriented toward youth rather than adult programs. Establishing a clearly defined joint-use agreement between involved agencies is critical to making school park relationships workable. This is particularly important with respect to acquisition, development, maintenance, liability, use, and programming of facility issues.

The orientation of school park projects is typically for neighborhood and community recreation services. The functions may include sports, recreation classes, passive recreation activities, and other recreation programs suitable to an elementary or secondary education school.

County Park

1. Definition Summary:

A county park provides sufficient park and recreation area to meet the needs of county residents. County parks consist of land that is specifically set aside for active and passive

recreation uses, and that accommodates large gatherings, special events, and individual users. County parks offer a wide variety of compatible outdoor recreation activities, and may provide areas that do not primarily serve a recreational purpose such as protected natural areas, historic areas, and special use areas.

2. Size Objectives:

The size of recreation parks varies greatly from park to park, but with the exception of those parks that serve a special use or are trail corridors, a recreation park should consist of a minimum of 100 acres of land. Each park should be of sufficient size to accommodate the estimated use and to allow for the operation and maintenance of planned recreational facilities.

3. Service Area Objectives:

County parks provide for a regional user group and serve primarily county residents. Special facilities like camping and trails are also used by tourists and visitors to the county.

4. Location Objectives:

The land should have high recreational potential and be able to withstand intensive and extensive recreational activities. Land should have potential to accommodate large groups of people. Land for corridors should be located so as to connect to communities, parks, and open spaces. The potential for future land acquisition should be taken into account.

5. Program Objectives:

Development should be appropriate for intended use and should accommodate moderate to high use. Development and planning should consider the physical condition and characteristics of the land and recognize potential environmental or structural limitations that might require intensive maintenance. County parks may include the following facilities:

- a. Camping/group camping
- b. Picnic areas
- c. Recreational trails (hiking, bicycling, mountain biking, equestrian, cross-country ski, snowmobile, etc.)
- d. Play areas

- e. Swimming beaches
- f. Water access
- g. Fishing access
- h. Shelters
- i. Restrooms
- j. Shower facilities
- k. Sport fields (basketball, volleyball, softball, etc.)
- l. Pet exercise area

6. Orientation:

Multi-purpose service area and regional recreation resource serving a significant portion of a county or multi-county population.

7. Function:

To provide sufficient parks and recreation areas to meet the needs of the people of the county.

8. Space, Design, and Service Area:

The size of a county park should be a minimum of 100 acres. Facilities vary by park. Some parks offer active recreation (camping, recreational trails, etc.), while others provide passive recreation (scenic lookouts, picnic areas, beaches, etc.). Most parks provide both active and passive recreation. County parks provide for a regional user group and serve primarily county residents, through special facilities also serve tourists and visitors to the county.

State Forest

1. Definition Summary:

A state forest consists of well blocked areas of state owned lands that are managed to benefit present and future generations of residents, recognizing that forests contribute to local and statewide economics and to a healthy natural environment. State forests practice sustainable forestry. The management of state forests is consistent with the ecological capability of state forest land and with the long-term goal of maintaining sustainable forest communities and ecosystems. Benefits of maintaining these ecosystems include soil protection, public hunting, protection of water quality, production of recurring forest products, outdoor recreation, native biological

diversity, aquatic and terrestrial wildlife, and aesthetic value. The range of benefits provided in each state forest reflect its unique character and position in the regional landscape.

2. Size Objectives:

Typically between 1,000 and 250,000 acres, but can be larger or smaller.

3. Service Area Objectives:

Generally a 100 mile radius. State forests typically provide close-to-home recreational area. Day users typically travel approximately 50 miles one-way to reach state forests, while overnight users tend to travel further, approximately 100-150 miles one-way. Travel to state forests can, however, exceed 160 miles for longer vacation stays and travel to "destination areas."

4. Location Objectives:

Areas with large blocks of land.

5. Program Objectives:

State forests must meet ecological, economic, social, and cultural needs. Elements are compatible with the natural resource setting and park site constraints. Facilities may include the following:

Cross-country ski trails	2,551 acres per linear mile of trail
Snowmobile trails	639 acres per linear mile of trail
Equestrian trails	559 acres per linear mile of trail

6. Orientation:

Multi-purpose service area and regional recreation resource serving a significant portion of a state or regional population.

7. Function:

To provide for nature conservation, provide income to forest owners, supply raw materials to the wood processing industry, and provide public recreation.

8. Space, Design, and Service Area:

The size of a state forest is determined by the extent of the area's natural resources and

recreation capabilities. There is no minimum or maximum size for a state forest. Facilities are not universal and vary by forest. The geographic location of the forest and the natural resources present dictate recreation available at the site. State forests serve large geographic areas of a state or region.

State Park

1. Definition Summary:

A state park, by size, program, and location, provides space for outdoor recreation and education about nature and conservation. These parks serve a significant geographic segment of a state or regional population. State parks aim to preserve, protect, interpret and enhance the scenic and cultural resources of the state.

2. Size Objectives:

Parks must be large enough to accommodate a reasonable mix of outdoor recreational activities. Typically, parks are between 500 and 3000 acres, but can be smaller (<20 acres) or larger (>10,000 acres).

3. Service Area Objectives:

Generally a 100-mile radius. State parks typically provide close-to-home recreational areas. Day users generally travel approximately 50 miles one-way to reach state parks, while overnight users tend to travel further, approximately 100-150 miles one-way. Travel distances to state parks can often exceed 160 miles for longer vacation stays and trips to "destination areas."

4. Location Objectives:

Siting of Wisconsin State Parks is typically based on five criteria developed by John Nolen. These criteria are: 1) large size to serve a large number of citizens, 2) accessibility to major population areas, 3) a healthful, natural setting, 4) reasonable cost for land acquisition, 5) land possessing "decidedly uncommon charm and beauty." All, or a combination of these criteria are used to determine where to site a state park.

5. Program Objectives:

Elements that fulfill the service area, park facilities and recreation program demands.

Elements are compatible with the natural resource setting and park site constraints. Developments may include the following facilities:

5. Orientation:

7. Space, Design, and Service Area:

The size of a state park is determined by the extent of the area's natural resources and recreation capabilities. There is no minimum or maximum size for a state park. Facilities are not universal and vary by park. Some parks offer active recreation (camping, boating, mountain biking trails, hunting etc.), while others offer passive recreation (scenic lookouts, picnic areas, beaches, etc.). Most provide both active and passive recreation. The geographic area and the natural resources present dictate recreation uses and facilities present in the park. State parks serve large geographic areas of a state or region.

Acquisition and Development of Local Parks (ADLP) Grants [Stewardship]

ADLP grants are awarded to improve community recreation areas and acquire land for public outdoor recreation. Priority is given to land acquisition where a need for additional recreational land is supported by an approved comprehensive outdoor recreation plan.

Acquisition of Development Rights (ADR) [Stewardship]

The purpose of the acquisition of development rights (ADR) subprogram is to protect natural, agricultural or forest lands that enhance and/or provide nature-based outdoor recreation. ADR grants can only fund conservation easement purchases.

ATV/UTV Enhancement

This funding is issued bi-annually to non-profit organizations that promote the safe and wise use of all terrain vehicles (ATVs)/utility-terrain vehicles (UTVs), ATV/UTV riding and ATV/UTV education.

ATV/UTV Patrols

This grant is issued to Wisconsin sheriff departments that participate in ATV enforcement efforts. The DNR can provide up to 100% of county net costs for the enforcement of ATV regulations. Actual funding received is based on total allotted funds split between participating agencies.

Patrol requirements are contained in NR 50.125, Wis. Adm. Code.

ATV/UTV Trails

Counties, towns, cities, villages and tribes can apply for funds to acquire, insure, develop and maintain ATV/UTV trails, areas and routes.

Specific changes to NR 64 created Hybrid Trails ("Troutes") or all-terrain vehicle trail and route combinations.

Boat Enforcement Patrol

Eligibility & Purpose: This grant is issued to Wisconsin counties or municipalities that participate in boating enforcement efforts. Eligible agencies may receive law enforcement aids for up to 75% of their net costs.

Boating Infrastructure Grant (BIG) Program

The purpose of BIG is to construct, renovate, and maintain boating infrastructure facilities for transient recreational vessels at least 26 feet long.

Tier 1 - State

Provides up to \$200,000 per year to each state. Projects are competitively ranked within the state.

Tier 2 - National

Provides up to \$1,500,000 per project. Projects are competitively ranked at the national level.

Natural Areas [Stewardship – Only available to nonprofits]

Stewardship natural area grants complement the State Natural Areas (SNA) Program, dedicated to the preservation of Wisconsin's native natural communities and habitat for rare plant and animal species.

Land purchased with natural area grants must be open to the public for low-impact nature-based recreation and scientific study. Natural areas are not intended for intensive recreational use such as mountain biking, motorized vehicle use, horseback riding or camping.

Habitat Areas [Stewardship – Only available to nonprofits]

Habitat area grants are awarded to conserve wildlife habitat in Wisconsin in order to expand opportunities for wildlife-based recreation such as hunting, trapping, hiking, bird watching, fishing, nature appreciation and wildlife viewing.

Land purchased with habitat area grants must be open to the public for low-impact nature-based recreation. Habitat areas are not intended for intensive recreational use such as mountain biking, motorized vehicle use, horseback riding or camping.

Stream Bank protection [Stewardship – Only available to nonprofits]

Streambank protection grants are awarded to protect water quality and fish habitat.

Priority is given to land or easement purchases along designated Outstanding or Exceptional Resource Waters, projects that connect sections of protected stream corridor, and projects that will mitigate the impact of agricultural runoff.

State trails [Stewardship – Only available to nonprofits]

State trail grants are awarded to purchase lands or easements identified as part of the State Trail system including designated State Water Trails. Priority is given to lands along nationally designated Ice Age and North Country trail corridors and to lands that connect established trail systems.

Land & Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) – State Program

This is a federal program administered in all states that encourages the creation and interpretation of high-quality outdoor recreational opportunities. Funds received by the DNR for this program are split between DNR projects and grants to local governments for outdoor recreation activities. Grants cover 50% of eligible project costs.

Motorized Stewardship Grants [Stewardship]

ATV/UTV grants are available to counties, towns, cities, villages and tribes to apply for funds to acquire, insure, develop and maintain ATV/UTV trails, areas and routes.

Snowmobile trail grants are available to counties and tribes to apply for funding to provide a statewide system of well-signed and well-groomed snowmobile trails for public use and enjoyment.

Match Requirement: 20 percent

Recreational Boating Facilities Grants [Stewardship]

These grants may be used by counties, towns, cities, villages, tribes, sanitary districts, public inland lake protection and rehabilitation districts and qualified lake associations for recreational boating facility projects.

Past projects have included ramps and service docks to gain access to the water, purchase of aquatic weed harvesting equipment, navigation aids and dredging waterway channels.

Recreational Trails Program (RTP)

This is a federal program administered in all states. Municipal governments and incorporated organizations are eligible to receive reimbursement for the development and maintenance of recreational trails and trail-related facilities for both motorized and non-motorized recreational trail uses.

Eligible sponsors may be reimbursed for up to 50% of eligible project costs. Funds from this program may be used in conjunction with funds from the state snowmobile or ATV grant programs and Knowles-Nelson Stewardship development projects.

Shooting Range Grant Program

Counties, cities, villages, townships, other governmental agencies or units, clubs or organizations, businesses or corporations and educational institutions can apply for assistance in outdoor shooting range construction, including backstops and berms, target holders, shooting benches, baffles, protective fencing, signs, trenches, gun racks, platforms, restrooms and other items considered essential for the project by the department. Indoor ranges may be eligible as well, including classroom, storage and restroom facilities.

Snowmobile Patrols

This grant is issued to Wisconsin sheriff departments that participate in snowmobile enforcement efforts. The DNR can provide up to 100% of county net cost for the enforcement of snowmobile regulations. Actual funding received is based on total allotted funds split between participating agencies.

Snowmobile Trail Aids

These grants are used to reimburse the over 600 snowmobile clubs in Wisconsin for some of their expenses.

Snowmobile trail aids are entirely funded by snowmobilers. The money awarded in grants to Wisconsin counties comes from snowmobile registrations, trail pass revenue and gas tax from some of the gas used in snowmobiles.

Sport Fish Restoration (SFR)

These grants may be used to construct fishing piers and motorboat access projects. Eligible components include boat ramp construction and renovation, along with related amenities such as parking lots, accessible paths, lighting, and restroom facilities. Funding for this program comes from federal excise taxes on fishing equipment and a portion of the federal gas tax.

Surface Water Grants

[Formerly: Lake Management Planning and Lake Classification and Lake Protection Grants.]

The surface water grant program provides cost-sharing grants for surface water protection and restoration. Funding is available for education, ecological assessments, planning, implementation, and aquatic invasive species prevention and control. With many different projects eligible for grant funding, you can support surface water management at any stage: from organization capacity development to project implementation.

Urban Green Space [Stewardship]

The intent of the Urban Green Space Program (UGS) is to provide open natural space within or in proximity to urban areas; to protect from development areas within or in proximity to urban areas that have scenic, ecological or other natural value; and to provide land for non-commercial gardening for the residents of an urbanized area.

Urban Rivers [Stewardship]

The urban rivers subprogram program aims to restore or preserve the character of urban riverways through the acquisition or development of land adjacent to rivers. Purposes of the program include supporting economic revitalization through the restoration or preservation of urban riverfronts and improving outdoor recreational opportunities by increasing access to urban rivers.

Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)

Purpose: The Transportation Alternatives Program allocates federal funds to transportation improvement projects that “expand travel choice, strengthen the local economy, improve the quality of life, and protect the environment.”

TAP is a legislative program authorized by Congress through the Fixing America’s Surface Transportation (FAST) Act signed into law in 2015. Safe Routes to School Programs, Bicycle & Pedestrian Facilities programs, and transportation enhancements are all TAP-eligible projects, including this plan. WisDOT facilitates TAP program and funding management

Construction projects eligible for TAP must have a total projected expense of \$300,000 or more, while non-construction projects must have a total projected expense in excess of \$50,000.

Safe Routes to School (SRTS)

[A Transportation Alternatives Program]

Purpose: Safe Routes to School programs encourage children in grades K-8 to walk and bike to school by creating safer walking and biking routes. Projects must be within 2 miles of a school that has a SRTS plan, and funding requires a 20% match.

Local Transportation Enhancements (TE)

[A Transportation Alternatives Program]

Purpose: Funds projects to increase multi-modal transportation alternatives and enhance communities and the environment. Projects include bicycle or pedestrian facilities, landscaping or streetscaping, and the preservation of historic transportation structures.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Program (BFPF)

[A Transportation Alternatives Program]

Purpose: Funds projects that construct or plan for bicycle or bicycle/pedestrian facilities.

Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)

While HSIP does not pertain to bicycle and pedestrian transportation, this WisDOT program can help improve safety measures on problematic stretches of highway where crashes have occurred in the past, thereby creating a safer and more hospitable transportation network. HSIP improvements generally require a ten percent match of state or local funds. The program generally funds low-cost options that can be implemented quickly.

Federal Assistance Programs

All other federal programs are listed under Wisconsin DNR Administered Programs.

Challenge Cost Share Program (CCSP) – National Park Service

Purpose: The Challenge Cost Share Program supports local projects that promote conservation and recreation, environmental stewardship, education and engaging diverse youth participants. Local project partners work with National Park Service parks and programs to achieve mutually beneficial outcomes. NPS administered parks and programs are eligible such as National Trails, Heritage Areas, and Wild and Scenic Rivers.,

One-third of the CCSP pot is earmarked for National Trails System Projects. Thus supporting work under the National Trails System Act (16 U.S.C. 1241-51), such as: National Scenic and Historic trails, National Scenic and Historic Trails in parks, National Recreation Trails, and rail-trail projects.



















Q29 What is your gender?



GAPS AND NEEDS IN OUR EXISTING RECREATION OPPORTUNITIES

In developing the following statewide needs and gaps in our recreation opportunities, the department incorporated information from:

- The SCORP recreation participation survey question regarding needed recreation opportunities in residents' home county (Appendix 6).
- Recreation Opportunities Analysis, which identified recreation needs for each of the eight regions of the state (Appendix 8).
- The SCORP survey of county park directors, which asked about needs at the county level (Appendix 4).
- The SCORP Advisory Team and department staff.

Statewide Recreation Needs:

Places near population centers

Because of the inverse distribution of our population and public lands as well as the limited amount of time people have to participate, there is a very large need to provide more places for people to participate in outdoor recreation near where they live. In particular is the need to provide opportunities for residents to visit places after work or for a couple of hours on a weekend. Places that provide opportunities for hiking, all types of bicycle riding, dog walking, picnicking, and different water-related activities such as fishing, canoeing and kayaking are likely to be heavily used.

Trails

By nearly every measure, the largest need throughout the state is for more trails that enable people to experience natural settings, visit the vibrant downtowns of our cities and villages, commute to work, and access favorite sites. All types of trails are in demand – hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, snowmobiling, ATV/UTV and motorcycle riding, and 4WD vehicle trails.

Water access – shoreline and boat launches

Lakes, streams and rivers are a defining feature of Wisconsin. From the Great Lakes to the Mississippi River, from the thousands of inland lakes and the tens of thousands of miles of flowing water, residents and visitors have been drawn to the water's edge to fish, hunt, launch any manner of watercraft, bird watch and beach walk. Access to water remains a universal need throughout the state.

Camping opportunities

With a large cohort of retirees travelling in RVs combined with an adventurous younger generation, demand for camping has grown in recent years and is likely to remain popular for years to come. Given the divergence in desired experiences – some campers wanting access to hot showers and WiFi while others wanting neither – recreation providers will need to collaborate and coordinate on providing the camping experiences best suited to different public lands.

Statewide Recreation Needs: (cont.)

Dog parks and exercise areas

Taking care of a dog has many benefits, not the least of which is the exercise people get in walking their pets. With the steady rise in dog ownership (75% of people in their thirties own a dog) and an urbanizing population has come an increasing demand for places to walk, play with, socialize and train our canine friends. Many municipal and county dog parks are among their most visited properties.

Target shooting ranges

Many hunters and shooting sports participants live in rural areas or belong to gun clubs and practice their craft on their or the club's property. However, as our population continues to urbanize there is a growing need for places where people can practice gun and archery marksmanship and safety. By their nature, firearm ranges generate considerable sounds and siting new ranges has been a challenge in more populated areas of the state.

Statewide Policy Needs:

Better understand place-based recreation and associated outcomes

The survey conducted for this SCORP on recreation participation generated considerable data on which outdoor activities residents pursue and how often (see Appendix 6). What is not well known is where these "participation days" actually take place – that is, where, when, and why they occur at different places. Questions for which more detailed, property-specific, place-based data are needed include:

- How many people visit the place or property?
- When and what are the patterns of visitation?
- What recreation activities do they pursue?
- How far do visitors travel to reach the property and why did they visit the particular property (as opposed to other options)?
- What would improve their satisfaction?
- What are the economic, health, and social benefits associated with their visit?

With a more complete understanding of property use and the features and attributes that draw people, agencies can make more informed decisions about what types of recreation facilities to build and maintain at different places. And the public can better understand their "return on investment."

Better understand the nature-based recreation preferences of our diversifying population

Data are needed on the recreation preferences of our changing population. For a range of reasons, people of varying ages, residential settings, incomes, and social, racial, ethnic and cultural identities participate in different types of outdoor activities in different places. More information is needed on the types of activities and settings sought by the diversity of Wisconsin residents. In addition, data on how and where to most effectively provide quality experiences for people with varying backgrounds and cultures are needed.

Enhance and stabilize funding for outdoor recreation

Funding for conservation and recreation is derived from many sources and the overall total has fluctuated considerably from year to year. This has complicated efforts to plan, develop, and maintain recreation facilities. Some states have implemented funding sources that provide a more stable source of money for conservation and recreation projects. In addition to more consistent funding, there is a need to broaden the network of people and sources that help pay for the management of public lands in the state.

Expand collaborations among recreation providers

Each recreation provider has unique capabilities and their lands offer different types of experiences, features, facilities, and opportunities. There would be substantial benefit in continuing and expanding collaborations among federal, county and local governments. Focus should be placed on identifying ways to coordinate recreation experiences in each region of the state, minimizing duplicative efforts, and maximizing the benefits of recreation investments.

Together, providing well-planned, safe and enjoyable recreation opportunities that visitor's value will increase support for local communities and businesses, strengthen tourism, respond to evolving demographic and visitor needs, reduce user conflicts and improve natural settings.



Bicycle Parking Guidelines

A summary of recommendations from the Association of Pedestrian and Bicycle Professionals

Bicycle Parking Design

- Required spaces shall be at least 2 feet by 6 feet.
- An access aisle of at least 5 feet shall be provided in each facility.
- Racks shall be situated to allow a minimum of 2 feet between adjacent bike parking stalls.
- Spaces shall have a vertical clearance of at least 80 inches.

Bicycle Rack Design

Structures that require a user-supplied locking device:

- must accommodate U-shaped locking devices;
- support the bike frame at two points;
- be securely anchored to the ground or the building structure; and
- be designed and maintained to be mud and dust free.

Bicycle Rack Location

- Racks should be located in a clearly designated safe and convenient location.
- Racks should be designed and located to be harmonious with the surrounding environment.
- Racks should be at least as convenient as the majority of auto parking spaces provided.




