#### I. Department of Military Affairs

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to approve the department's request for a one-time supplement of \$2,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2023-24 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the department's division of emergency management; pre-disaster flood resilience grants appropriation under s. 20.465(3)(dn) for the pre-disaster flood resilience grant program.

#### II. Department of Transportation

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to approve the department's request for a one-time supplement of \$6,000,000 SEG from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(u) to the department's driver education grants, state funds appropriation under s. 20.395(5)(eq) in fiscal year 2024-25.

#### III. Department of Public Instruction

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to approve the department's request for a supplement of \$500,000 GPR in each of fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the department's recovery high schools; grants appropriation under s. 20.255(3)(ef) for grants to public, private, or Tribal high schools for the operation and planning of schools that are designed for pupils recovering from substance use disorders.

#### IV. Wisconsin Technical College System Board

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to approve the system's request for a one-time supplement of \$19,842,600 GPR in fiscal year 2023-24 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the system's grants to district boards appropriation under s. 20.292(1)(f) to expand the state's oral health care workforce.

#### V. Department of Children and Families

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to approve the department's request for a supplement of \$500,000 GPR in each of fiscal years 2023-24 and 2024-25 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the department's national reading program grants appropriation under s. 20.437(1)(em) for administering national reading program grants. All funding is to be used solely for grants and not for administrative purposes.

#### VI. Department of Health Services

Moved by Senator Johnson and seconded by Representative McGuire to approve the department's request for a base-building supplement of \$2,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2024-25 from the Committee's appropriation under s. 20.865(4)(a) to the department's general program operations appropriation under s. 20.435(5)(a) for the implementation of a virtual behavioral health crisis services pilot program to be used by county or municipal law enforcement officers.

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to transfer \$2,000,000 GPR in fiscal year 2024-25 from the Committee's appropriation under s 20.865(4)(a) to the department's general program operations appropriation under 20.435(5)(a) in fiscal year 2024-25 for the department to make grants under a law enforcement officer virtual behavioral health crisis pilot program. Specify that this funding will be excluded from the appropriation's adjusted base for the purposes of the 2025-27 biennial budget.

#### VII. Department of Health Services

Moved by Senator Johnson and seconded by Representative McGuire to approve the department's plan for the expenditure of \$36,000,000 in settlement funds for Wisconsin's share of funds to be received from proceedings under In re: National Prescription Opiate Litigation, Case No: MDL 2804 to be allocated in the following manner: a) \$6,000,000 to federally recognized Tribes for prevention, harm reduction, treatment and recovery; b) \$7,000,000 for harm reduction initiatives; c) \$3,000,000 for capital projects to expand and support recovery housing; d) \$2,000,000 for K-12 prevention programming; e) \$1,000,000 as a grant to support after-school programming provided through the Boys and Girls Club organizations; f) \$500,000 to the Alliance for Wisconsin Youth to support community coalitions working to prevent opioid misuse; g) \$2,500,000 allocation to fund room and board cost for Medicaid recipients who receive services under Medicaid's residential substance use disorder treatment program; h) \$1,000,000 to distribute as grants to law enforcement agencies; i) \$1,500,000 to fund substance use data collection, monitoring and reporting activities to implement 2021 Wisconsin Act 181; j) \$5,000,000 to fund grants to help establish family resource centers to provide various supportive services for families of individuals who have an opioid disorder; k) \$5,000,000 to fund grants to opioid treatment programs to train and employ peer support specialists to assist individuals receiving treatment; and 1) \$1,500,000 allocated for post-secondary education initiatives focused on prevention and harm reduction strategies.

Ayes, 3; Noes, 12 (Marklein, Stroebel, Felzkowski, Ballweg, Testin, Wimberger, Born, Katsma, Zimmerman, Rodriguez, Kurtz, Dallman); Absent, 1 (Roys)

Moved by Senator Marklein and seconded by Representative Born to allocate \$36,000,000 in opioid settlement proceeds for fiscal year 2024-25, as follows:

- 1. Tribal Allocations. Allocate \$6,000,000 to federally recognized Tribes in Wisconsin, with the requirement that Tribes identify strategies across the continuum of prevention, harm reduction, treatment and recovery for which they plan to use the funds, including culturally relevant strategies to prevent opioid use, promote health and community practices.
- 2. Harm Reduction Strategies. Allocate \$6,000,000 for harm reduction initiatives, including, but not limited to, programs that the Department of Health Services currently administers, such as Narcan Direct for distribution of overdose reversal medication, and a program for the distribution of test strips for detection of fentanyl or other substances that pose a high risk of adverse reactions. Direct the department to expand the drugs and medications available under the Narcan Direct program to include all opioid reversal drugs and medications approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration.

Of the funding for harm reduction strategies, require the department to allocate the following:
(a) \$500,000 for a safe disposal kit dispensing program, modeled after Iowa's Disposal Kit Dispensing Program administered by the Iowa Department of Inspections, Appeals, and Licensing, which reimburses pharmacies for providing free disposal kits and patient education to individuals who may be at risk of accidental opioid or other controlled substance misuse or overdose; and (b) \$500,000 for the department to provide as grants to small facilities, including, but not limited to, veterinary clinics, behavioral health facilities, surgery centers, nursing homes, fire stations, dental offices, correctional facilities, and rural clinics to purchase electronic lock boxes for storing and tracking narcotics. Include the following parameters for the electronic lock box program: (a) limit grants to \$12,500 per facility; (b) require grantees to provide a 25% match for the cost of the purchase, and to cover all costs of ongoing system maintenance, including any service fees and subscriptions; and (c) direct the department

to award grants on a competitive basis, providing priority to facilities in rural areas and those demonstrating high urgency or potential impact.

- 3. Capital Projects. Allocate \$7,700,000 for the Department of Health Services to fund capital projects that would expand prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services through the construction of new facilities, and to renovate existing facilities to improve services. Require the department to distribute at least 30% of the funds for projects in counties with fewer than 500,000 residents.
- 4. K-12 Prevention Program. Allocate \$1,000,000 for the Department of Public Instruction to distribute to school districts, independent charter schools, tribal schools, and private choice schools to implement evidence-based substance use prevention programming. Direct the department to distribute this funding in the same manner as the department distributes funding under its current substance abuse grants program. Prohibit the department from using any of this allocation on operations costs to administer the program.
- 5. Grant to a Statewide Community-Based Organization. Allocate \$1,000,000 for the Department of Health Services to provide a grant to a community-based organization that serves after-school youth for the purpose of implementing and expanding opioid prevention programs. The organization must use local law enforcement partnerships in its effort to reduce opioid abuse.
- 6. Community-Based Prevention -- Competitive Grant Program. Allocate \$1,500,000 for the Department of Health Services to provide as grants to community anti-drug coalitions, nonprofit agencies, and faith-based organizations to support prevention programs. Specify that these entities could use the funds to support the following activities: (a) drug prevention; (b) evidence-informed prevention; (c) stigma reduction; (d) training in evidence-informed implementation; (e) community-based education or intervention services; (f) programs and curricula to address mental health needs of young people; and (g) any other activities permissible under the settlement agreements. Of the funding allocated for community-based prevention, require the department to allocate \$500,000 to community coalitions supported by the Alliance for Wisconsin Youth.
- 7. Medication-Assisted Treatment. Allocate \$3,000,000 to support medication-assisted treatment and related services, consistent with the purposes of the Settlement Agreement, for individuals with opioid use disorder. Specify that at least 50% of this allocation must be provided to nongovernmental entities.
- 8. Room and Board Grants for Residential Substance Use Disorder Treatment. Allocate \$2,750,000 to fund room and board costs for Medicaid recipients who receive services under Medicaid's residential substance use disorder treatment program.
- 9. Law Enforcement Grants. Allocate \$3,000,000 for the Department of Health Services to distribute to law enforcement agencies, under a competitive grant program, for the following purposes:
  (a) medication-assisted treatment education and awareness training; (b) community drug disposal programs; (c) treatment of jail inmates with opioid use disorder (OUD); (d) supporting pre-arrest or pre-arraignment diversion and deflection strategies for persons with OUD and any co-occurring substance use disorder or mental health conditions; and (e) any other permissible uses under the settlement agreements. Specify that at least \$1,000,000 of this amount would be reserved for agencies in counties or municipalities with 70,000 or fewer residents.

- 10. Substance Use Disorder Treatment Platform. Allocate \$1,200,000 for the Department of Health Services to provide \$300,000 per year for four years, to pay a vendor for collecting and maintaining information regarding substance use disorder treatment providers for the state's substance use disorder treatment platform.
- 11. Data Collection and Surveillance System Enhancement. Allocate \$1,500,000 to fund substance use data collection, monitoring, and reporting activities needed for the Department of Administration to implement the provisions of 2021 Wisconsin Act 181.
- 12. Public Awareness and Prevention Campaign. Allocate \$750,000 for the Department of Health Services to educate the public about opioid use disorder, responsible prescription opioid use, signs of opioid use in others, and proper opioid disposal.
- 13. Medical College of Wisconsin -- Periscope Project. Allocate \$600,000 to support the Medical College of Wisconsin's Periscope Project.
